I. CALL TO ORDER

The September 25, 2024 Curriculum Committee meeting was called to order by Chair Ghida Neukirch at 2:02 p.m.

II. ROLL CALL ~ ESTABLISHMENT OF A QUORUM

Roll was called by Michelle Mlinar, and a quorum of voting members was established.

III. APPLICATION FOR SCHOOL/COURSE CERTIFICATION

Heather Hotz presented the Committee with a Course Design Document for the *DOJ/COPS Vehicular Pursuit Management: Balancing Risks and Enhancing Safety* course. Paul Petty discussed the specifics of the course, noted the course is designed for upper management, and it has not yet been rolled out to the COPS portal.

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Ryan, and carried by all members present to recommend certification of the DOJ/COPS Vehicular Pursuit Management: Balancing Risks and Enhancing Safety course as presented.

Mitchell Davis asked that the information on this course be forwarded to the different risk management providers throughout the state so state specific items can be covered. Hotz acknowledged the concern and will follow up.

IV. IN-SERVICE, ADVANCED AND SPECIALIZED COURSES FOR CERTIFICATION/RECERTIFICATION ~ Paul Petty

Paul Petty asked for approval of the in-service, advanced and specialized training certified courses for May 15, 2024 – September 14, 2024 located under Tab K, attachment seven, in the Board book.

In response to a question, John Keigher stated the officer compliance reporting begins next year. This process will require verification with each agency, and the review of two other components of the verification process. Staff plans to have the verification process ready by August of 2025 as the first warning must go out in October 2025, a second warning must be sent by March 2026, and verification of officers A-G is April 2026.

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Ryan, and carried by all members present to approve the In-Service, Advanced and Specialized certified courses for May 15, 2024 through September 14, 2024.

V. LEAD HOMICIDE INVESTIGATORS 32-HOURS APPROVED CONTINUING EDUCATION COURSES for CERTIFICATION/RECERTIFICATION ~ Paul Petty

Paul Petty asked for approval of the Lead Homicide Investigator courses submitted for May 15, 2024 – September 14, 2024 located under Tab K, attachment eight, in the Board book.

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Ryan, and carried by all members present to approve the Lead Homicide Investigator 32-Hour Continuing Education certified courses submitted for May 15, 2024 through September 14, 2024.

VI. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

POWER Test Work Group: John Keigher reported the POWER Test Work Group met in August. They are exploring issues and concerns with the current POWER test so they can move forward with revised standards. They are also looking at the standards in Wisconsin, and some of their team has reached out with major changes they have implemented to their program. One item of note is that they went to a gender-neutral single standard for the entire state that was vetted by the DOJ. Working Group Chair, Mike Schlosser is looking to bring in an expert to help with standards. The next meeting of the Work Group is scheduled for October.

VII. NEW BUSINESS

Military Police and Department of Army Civilian Police-State Reciprocity

Chris Haubrich made a presentation to the Committee on the benefits of allowing Military Police state reciprocity. Haubrich gave a presentation regarding revisions and

enhancements to the general Military Police training curriculum enacted over the last few years that bring it into alignment with what most states are now offering to law enforcement officers. With these changes, many states now offer reciprocity waivers for military police officers and he explained it has been requested that the Board consider this as well. Haubrich identified a few areas that would need reinforcement and believes that the “Law for Police” course, combined with a few other short courses, could become the basis for offering reciprocity to this group of officers in near future. The presentation is attached.

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Bulnes, and carried by all members present to move the program forward as presented.

Mitchell Davis stated he was asked to bring up the possibility of scheduling testing retakes on a monthly basis going forward. Davis also mentioned he recently attended the NOBLE conference, and Illinois was complemented as being one of the states utilizing the COPS classes. Davis then mentioned the Holocaust Museum is working with him to present a training on Discrimination and Hate Crimes; an eight-hour course to be presented at the museum, and a four-hour version that departments can host. Davis plans to set a time to invite the Board to attend the full eight-hour version so it can be certified by the Board. Davis also stated that there is legislation in the works for mandated training for discrimination and hate crimes, he was able to get the commission to push back so they could partner with the Board to move forward.

I. CALL TO ORDER

The September 25, 2024 Joint Finance & Legislative and Executive Committee meeting was called to order at 3:01 p.m. by Chairman Sean Smoot.

III. FINANCIAL MATTERS

A. *Financial Items ~ Steven Pingolt*

Steven Pingolt stated expenditures through September 4, 2024 and an analysis of funds can be found under Tab F. Pingolt replied to a grant question and stated for the Recruitment and Retention grant, the full amount of funds was distributed, but for all other grants, the full amount was not distributed. This year [FY25] for camera grants the Board was appropriated \$60 million and the grant should open soon. \$10 million was awarded for the FY24 camera grant program.

Motion was made by Idleburg, seconded by Price, and carried by all members present to approve the financial report.

B. *Personnel Matters & DEIA Report ~ Ellen Petty*

Ellen Petty stated her report can be found under Tab G in the Board book. Petty commented on a few updates that have happened since her report was submitted. She

stated two new field investigators started on August 1st, both are based in McLean County. Headcount is still at 40 employees; however, staff will be onboarding three new employees in October: a Receptionist/Secretary, a Specialized Training Assistant, and the Assistant Legal Counsel. There are two rounds of interviews scheduled for next week, for Chief Certification Counsel and the Web Developer. Interviews for the Public Information Officer will occur once CMS has given approval, and the Assistant Fiscal and Chief Accountability Officer position has been approved and will be posted soon. There are also several grant positions to be posted to help move the grant money out. There are currently two employees on a leave of absence.

C. Legislative and Litigation Update ~ John Keigher

John Keigher stated the litigation report will be given tomorrow at the full Board meeting during closed session. As for legislation, staff is watching the Hate Crimes bill that passed out of the Senate but did not pass in the House. Keigher noted staff is working on seven new proposals filed with the Lt. Governor and Governor's office that will hopefully be filed next spring. The seven proposed items are; experience requirement for training waiver, direct access to the Board's criminal history records, repercussions for failure to report officer misconduct, sheriff certification requirements, statewide Brady list, crisis therapy dog certification, and body cameras for auxiliary officers.

A brief discussion then followed around these items: feedback for the Governor's office on issues arising out of the Sonya Massey case specifically things that can be done without legislation, the possibility of increased penalties in schools due to social media content, could the Board start to certify Lead Homicide Officers in the Attorney General's office, and the police training accident in Massachusetts where a recruit was killed – it is imperative that the Board knows what is happening in the academies. Brendan Kelly added that the FBI and CISA released a tool kit today consisting of best practices for schools with instructions for clear and present danger reporting and working with local law enforcement.

Motion was made by Watson, seconded by Nugent, and carried by all members present to approve the Legislative and Litigation report.

IV. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. SAFE-T Act Update ~ John Keigher

Keigher reported that the Board has completed 17 of 21 requirements under the SAFE-T Act. Staff is working on the Administrative Rules for the discretionary decertification hearings. They will be filed with the Secretary of State, and there are plans for public meetings regarding the rules in October, starting October 11th. The certification verification is coming up, and the enhancements to the portals are being improved daily.

B. Grant Updates ~ John Keigher

Keigher stated grant funds have been appropriated, and NIBIN was reduced to \$2 million, Recruitment & Retention stayed the same at \$10 million, and the camera

grant was increased to \$60 million. Keigher then asked the Committee to recommend for approval full funding for the NIBIN Grant of \$2 Million, for \$7 million for Recruitment & Retention because that is all that is available in the fund at this time, and for \$30 million for cameras, with the reservation to ask for additional funds in December if funds are available.

The FY24 camera grant program ended at the end of June and staff disbursed \$10 million in camera grants. That is three times our highest award. The FY25 camera grant program is being updated as the BIMP bill requires advance funding to be allowed for camera grants. Keigher also noted that our grant team was recognized by the Governor's office for being the third highest awarding agency in the state.

V. NEW BUSINESS

Officer Reimbursement Agreements ~ John Keigher

Keigher stated that occasionally, the Board is presented with a situation in which an officer is being pursued by their former employer for leaving the agency while under a training reimbursement agreement. The Board has always discouraged these agreements as recruits must be treated with all the benefits of an employee and not a contractor at the time they are going through training. Staff is currently waiting on a memo from the Department of Labor as to how the Board should be handling this. Recently the Board was presented with a case in which an officer was pursued by the agency for \$6,500 in training costs. When researched, it was found that the Board had already reimbursed the agency \$9,500 for training and mileage. Under the Funds Recovery Act the Board is now on notice to ensure the Board's granted funds are properly spent and to not allow a double recovery to the agency. The Governor's office has suggested changing our policy.

VI. ADJOURNMENT

Motion was made by Kelly, seconded by Watson, and carried by all members present to adjourn the meeting at 3:27 p.m.

VIII. CHAIRMAN REMARKS

Chairman Smoot spoke to the Sonya Massey incident and is looking for ways for the Board to play a larger role to see that this doesn't happen in the future. He expects much legislation to come out in the next year because of the incident. Smoot then mentioned the tragedy that recently happened in a Massachusetts academy where a recruit was killed during training and said to expect a deeper dive into the training in our academies.

IX. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Motion was made by Watson, seconded by Davis, and carried by all members present to approve the meeting minutes for the Curriculum and School Standards Advisory Committee meeting from June 12, 2024.

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Watson, and carried by all members present to approve the meeting minutes for the Joint Finance & Legislative Committee and Executive Committee meeting from June 12, 2024.

Motion was made by Redd, seconded by Davis, and carried by all members present, with Gomez abstaining, to approve the meeting minutes for the Quarterly Board Meeting, Open Session only, from June 13, 2024.

X. REPORT OF STANDING AND ADVISORY COMMITTEES

- A. Curriculum and School Standards Advisory Committee ~ Ghida Neukirch
Neukirch stated the Committee met yesterday and approved a new DOJ course; *Vehicular Pursuit Management: Balancing Risks and Enhancing Safety* which is a web-based course. The Committee also approved the certification of In-Service training courses submitted through the Mobile Team Units & Executive Institute from May 15, 2024 – September 14, 2024. They also approved the Lead Homicide Investigators 32-Hour Continuing Education Courses submitted from May 15, 2024 – September 14, 2024. Neukirch stated the Committee received a thorough analysis of the Department of Defense's Basic Law Enforcement Curriculum. The Committee supported moving forward with this program and asked for a more formal policy to be created and brought back to the Board in December for formal consideration.
- B. Finance & Legislative Committee ~ John Idleburg
Idleburg stated the Committee met yesterday. A fiscal report was given by Steven Pingolt and the agency is financially stable. He noted that Ellen Petty discussed the personnel report, and John Keigher provided the legislation and litigation update, both reports will be

discussed again later in this meeting. Idleburg noted the items approved were the legislation and fiscal reports.

C. Waiver Review Committee ~ Brendan Kelly

Kelly stated the first Waiver Review Committee meeting was held last year regarding an appeal. The second Committee meeting was held yesterday to discuss another appeal, with Board staff presenting the denial material. The agency who appealed did not show, though the Committee did review the information provided by both parties and the Committee ruled unanimously with the waiver denial. Kelly noted some of the rules were updated, and noted a main update was the need to identify conflict [of interest], and that it should be a best practice for not just the Committee, but the Board as well.

Motion was made by Watson, seconded by Neukirch, and carried by all members present, with Mitchell Davis abstaining, to approve the Standing Advisory Committee Reports and their recommendations.

XI. EXECUTIVE MATTERS

A. Financial Items ~ Steven Pingolt

Pingolt stated the FY25 expenditures through September 24th, and cash flow analysis can be found under Tab F. Pingolt was asked if we actually have the \$60 million for the camera grants and Pingolt confirmed that is the case. Pingolt stated the Board is appropriated \$147 million for FY25, for FY 24 it was around \$129 million. He stated that the Board spent 50% to 60% of those funds, but noted when we finally get to a full headcount he anticipates we will spend close to 90% of the budgeted amount.

Motion was made by Nugent, seconded by Watson, and carried by all members present to approve the Financial Report.

B. Personnel Matters & DEIA Report ~ Ellen Petty

Petty noted her report can be found under Tab G in the Board book. Petty stated two new employees, both Field Investigators for McLean county, have been hired since the June meeting. Staff is still at a headcount of 40, and there are currently two employees on a leave of absence. Petty expects to have three new employees onboarded in October: a Receptionist/Secretary, the Specialized Training Assistant, and the Assistant Legal Counsel. Interviews will soon be conducted for the Chief Certification Counsel and the Web Designer position. The Assistant Fiscal and Chief Accountability Officer position has been approved and is expected to be posted soon. There will also be positions for two Certification Specialists and a Professional Standards Executive Secretary posted as well. There are several jobs that have been created and submitted to CMS for approval. Petty expects to be at a headcount of 66 by the end of this fiscal year. Petty reminded the Board members to please complete their DEIA and LGBTQIA trainings by the end of the calendar year.

C. Legislative and Litigation Update ~ John Keigher

Keigher stated he would give the litigation report later in the closed session. Currently no new bills of interest have been filed. Staff is watching a bill on Hate Crimes that has passed

in the Senate. Staff has also been working with the Governor's and Lt. Governor's office on seven proposals for the Spring session to cover some provisions of the SAFE-T Act. They are as follows; an experience requirement for training waivers, direct access for the Board to criminal history records, repercussions for failure of chiefs or sheriffs to report officer misconduct, enhance sheriff certification requirements, creating a statewide Brady List, Crisis Therapy Dog certification, and body cameras for auxiliary officers.

Kelly stated, regarding background information, ISP agrees that the Board should have direct NCIC access. He noted the previous denial was due to administrative/regulatory rules from several years ago, and that with the investigative responsibility given to the Board due to the SAFE-T Act a new argument should be made to the Department of Justice to overturn the previous denial. Kelly stated ISP will work with the Board on this issue.

Davis mentioned the statewide Commission on Hate Crimes, he said legislation with mandates was able to be pushed back at this time.

D. Department of Professional Standards

1. *Professional Conduct Database Quarterly Report ~ Anthony Cobb*

Cobb stated as of August 31st, his division has received 158 citizen complaints, which is 72 additional since the June Board meeting, and 212 professional conduct reports, which is 65 additional since the June Board meeting.

2. *Law Enforcement/Corrections/Court Security Waiver Disposition Quarterly Report ~ Anthony Cobb*

Cobb noted the report can be found under Tab H of the Board book. He stated for this reporting period, May 1st through July 31, 2024 his division has processed a total of 570 waiver requests. Cobb said 502 law enforcement waiver and reactivation requests were approved and 25 were denied, 27 correctional officer waiver requests were approved and two were denied, and 14 court security waiver requests were approved, and none were denied.

Cobb responded to a question and reported there seems to be an increase in Professional Conduct reports being filed because the awareness is now out there. He stated all complaints come to the Board in writing, by mail, and by the use of the online form. Cobb also stated staff has been presenting to the agencies about how to properly write and file a conduct report. A discussion followed around officers being out due to being under investigation, but still being on the payroll.

3. *Decertification ~ Pat Hahn*

Hahn reminded the Board that the automatic decertification procedure has recently changed due to a court ruling. The Board is now required to offer advance notice and the ability to respond to the decertification notification. Hahn then spoke about the four officers subject to automatic decertification, and also the four officers who are voluntarily surrendering their certification.

Smoot asked Hahn to list the departments where these officers are located so Board members could determine if there is a conflict of interest. Smoot then asked members

to identify where they have cases and abstain when taking the motions for both the decertifications and the waivers.

Motion was made by Neukirch and carried by all members present, with Watson, Kelly, Price, Tyler, Davis, Smoot, and Armenta, abstaining with respect to the officers affiliated with their current and former employers, to approve the identified automatic decertifications and voluntary surrenders of certification.

Motion was made by Watson, seconded by Kelly, and carried by all members present, with abstentions from Watson and Davis with respect to their employees, to approve the Law Enforcement/Corrections/Court Security Waiver Disposition Quarterly Report.

Members requested that the Waiver reports be sorted by city/department in the future. Neukirch asked for guidelines from legal as to when members should recuse themselves. Smoot then asked that on the day of the Committee meetings in December, to be scheduled prior to the Committee meetings, an hour seminar for legal counsel to address these issues.

XII. PROGRAM PROGRESS REPORTS AND CONCEPTS

A. Illinois Law Enforcement Executive Institute ~ Heather Hotz

Hotz stated they facilitated the 28th annual New Chiefs of Police Orientation in East Peoria with 57 chiefs in attendance. She noted this year the Online Learning Network surpassed 36,000 students, compared to this time last year numbers are up 10%. Hotz introduced Tracy Meredith as the new Program Coordinator of Business operations. Meredith will assist the Executive Institute team with grant management.

Davis asked to recognize Hotz and her team. He stated that COPS/Department of Justice (DOJ) did a presentation at the NOBLE National Conference, and they mentioned Illinois as a leading state offering DOJ courses.

B. A Statewide System of In-Service Training (ASSIST) Program ~ Paul Petty

Petty noted his ASSIST reports can be found under Tab K, and asked the Board to pay attention to attachment one and the hourly rate for training. He stated the goal is to keep instructional costs to under \$200 per hour and training costs to under \$10 per hour.

C. CIT and Mental Health Training Update ~ Jennifer Wooldridge

Wooldridge highlighted that the CIT therapy dog program is going well. She is looking forward to continuing the partnership with Cook County and their Tails of Redemption program to expand this initiative statewide. She noted at CIT International they met the team that went to Highland Park, and the hope is that our CIT teams will be able to do this for the state.

Plans are being made for the CIT state conference, and the Executive Institute has secured the East Peoria location for June 25 – 26, 2025.

Wooldridge also stated her team attended and presented at CIT International again this year. She noted the Seattle team approached them and said they never miss one of our presentations and will be taking ‘Coffee with Joe’ back to Seattle with them.

D. Information Technology Update ~ Kelly Ingram

Ingram stated his report is found under Tab N in the Board book. Ingram took a moment to recognize his team: Korteny keeps our servers online and our network secure, Andrew is our web developer and we also have Keith Wallace. Ingram then focused on Jason, stating he recently took on project management status to bring the training room and multipurpose room online in addition to his everyday responsibilities in network security and wireless.

E. Specialty Training Update ~ Barbara Wood

Wood stated her SRO report, and the six individuals needing Board approval to become Crash Reconstruction Specialists, can be found under Tab M in the Board book. She also thanked the Illinois State Police for inviting her to speak in front of the Ukraine Delegation at recent conference in Chicago.

Motion was made by Watson, seconded by Davis, and carried by all members present, with Smoot and Redd abstaining, to approve the six candidates as Crash Reconstruction Specialists.

Motion was made by Neukirch, seconded by Davis, and carried by all members present to approve the Program Progress Reports.

XIII. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. SAFE-T Act Update ~ John Keigher

Keigher reported that 17 of 21 requirements are completed. Staff continues to work on the Administrative Rules for the discretionary decertification hearings. A draft for the ALJ [Administrative Law Judges] posting is ready to go. Staff continues to complete administrative tasks as they arise. The Administrative Rules draft has been filed with the Secretary of State, and public hearings on these rules are upcoming, with the first one in Springfield on October 11th. Once the rules are in place discretionary decertification hearings can begin.

Keigher also reported that the three-year recertification process is still being worked out. This begins in October of 2025, with deficiency notices being sent in March 2026.

B. Grant Update ~ John Keigher

Keigher stated with the requirement to use the state’s Amplifund system a few years ago the process to move forward was daunting, but it has paid off as this year ILETSB is the agency with the third highest amounts awarded in the state. Staff is working with the GATU team to make revisions for the FY25 offering as the camera grant program now requires an advance funding option. Keigher noted the appropriations for the FY25 grants are generous however the Recruitment and Retention fund only has \$7 million in it at this time. Keigher asked the Board to approve a request for \$2 million for NIBIN, \$7 million for Recruitment and Retention, and \$30 million for cameras with the option to ask for approval for more at a later date.

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Redd, and carried by all members present to approve the request for \$2 million for NIBIN, \$7 million for Recruitment and Retention, and \$30 million for cameras, with the option to ask for approval for more at a later date.

C. Certification Review Committee ~ John Keigher

Keigher stated the Certification Review Panel will soon require a standing Committee. This Committee is designed to receive decertification appeals made to the Board.

XIV. NEW BUSINESS

A. Approval of updated “Basic Guidelines of Officer-Worn Cameras” ~ John Keigher

Keigher stated when Camera Grant Act was passed in 2016 it required the Board to create guidelines, which were passed in 2018, for any agency using body cameras. More recently there have been some changes to the Act and the guideline requirements, they are as follows: the removal of the detailed long form reporting requirement, changes as to when cameras must be on or off, additions allowing for instances for internal review of recorded footage, changes as to how erroneous deletions are to be reported, and a provision that allows for agency labeling of the recorded footage. A draft of the guideline changes was provided to Board members. Keigher asked the Board to review and send any comments to him. Keigher will present the guidelines at the December meeting for official approval and publishing on the website.

B. Officer Reimbursement Agreements ~ John Keigher

Keigher stated every few years the Board is made aware of an officer being pursued by a former agency for breaking a training agreement. The Board has always discouraged this type of agreement as trainees should be treated as employees, with full benefits, and not as contractors. Recently an officer was pursued by an agency for \$6,500 in small claims court for training and mileage. While researching, staff discovered the agency had already been reimbursed by the Board \$9,500 for this officer for those expenses. Staff researched the Grant Funds Recovery Act and put the agency on notice that the Board has an interest in any recovered funds. Staff has reached out to several offices to make sure this is being handled correctly and is now proposing an addition to the rule on the basic academy reimbursement, stating that the agency acknowledges they are not making their officers sign those agreements in order to receive Board funds. Keigher stated this is presented as a proposal, he is looking for feedback, and will present it for full approval in December.

C. Military Police and Department of Army Civilian Police – State Reciprocity

Chris Haubrich presented a PowerPoint presentation to the Curriculum Committee yesterday, and a condensed version to the full Board today. His presentation described revisions and enhancements to the general Military Police training curriculum enacted over the last few years that bring it into alignment with what most states are now offering to law enforcement officers. With these changes, many states now offer reciprocity waivers for military police officers and he explained it has been requested that the Board consider this as well. Haubrich identified a few areas that would need reinforcement and believes that the “Law for Police” course, combined with a few other short courses, could become the basis for offering reciprocity to this group of officers in near future. After discussion, it was

determined the next steps would be to deliver a copy of presentation to members. It was also determined that staff would need to draft a policy to identify all courses, training requirements, and competencies, and then determine how they compare to the current program. Once this is done, gaps will need to be identified, then the Board will determine how to fill those gaps using its training program. Members asked to see this laid out side by side, and so they could determine how to move forward.

On a different matter, Mitchell Davis interjected that the Illinois Chiefs have a concern about the availability of testing. It is their understanding that testing is only conducted in Springfield during certain months, and they would like for it to be more often and in additional locations. Cheryllynn Williams addressed the Board and stated that testing is currently done on the first Tuesday of every month at MTU 3 for retakes and the equivalency exam. On the second Wednesday of every month those same tests are given in the Springfield Main office. There are currently two opportunities, in two locations, every month to take exams.

XV. PUBLIC INPUT

Marcus Hargrett, Cook County Sheriff's Office, Retired Corrections Officer: Hargrett stated he was addressing the Board regarding his attempt gain an IROCC card. He stated prior to Sheriff Dart no one had issues gaining an IROCC card. Hargrett noted that Dart refuses to comply with the process and refuses to sign the applications. Hargrett mentioned that the Governor had signed a law that said if you are a retired corrections officer or a deputy sheriff you are a retired law enforcement officer, he then went on to accuse the Board of not being required to comply with the law. Hargrett then stated he wonders why the legislature has not stepped in and required this state Board to comply with the law. Hargrett's second issue with the Board is that back in 2023 he notified the Board that Chairman Smoot had previously been issued an IROCC card, and he asked that the Board remove the Chairman from office, so he has a fair chance at obtaining an IROCC card.

XVI. ANNOUNCEMENTS

Keigher announced the next Board meeting will be held on December 5, 2024 in the Chicago area. The next Curriculum and School Standards Advisory Committee meeting, and the Joint Finance & Legislative will be held on December 4, 2024.

XVII. CLOSED SESSION ~ LAWSUITS & LITIGATION

Motion was made by Watson, seconded by Price, and carried by all members present via roll call to move into closed session at 11:01 a.m. to discuss litigation and related closed session minutes from June 13, 2024 pursuant to 5 ILCS 120/2(c)(11) and 5 ILCS 120/2(c)(21) of the Open Meetings Act.

Motion was made by Watson, seconded by Price, and carried by all members present via roll call to move out of closed session at 12:06 p.m.

Meeting room doors were opened, and remaining attendees returned to the meeting.

XVIII. APPROVAL OF CLOSED MINUTES FROM JUNE 13, 2024

Motion was made by Price, seconded by Watson, and carried by all members present via roll call, to approve and keep closed, the closed session meeting minutes from June 13, 2024.

HIGH LEVEL OVERVIEW OF HIRING PROGRESS SINCE THE PASSAGE OF THE SAFE-T ACT

- 45 positions have been filled as of 10/31/24:
 - 8 internal promotions.
 - 2 internal transfers.
 - 14 new hires to State of Illinois employment.
 - 15 promotions from other agencies.
 - 1 reinstatement from another agency.
 - 7 transfers from other agencies.
- 6 employees have transferred out to other agencies.
- 8 employees have retired.
- 2 employees have been discharged (*One was grieved and went to arbitration.*)
- 1 employee was returned to work due to an arbitration award & then retired.
- 1 employee returned to work after a 4-year leave of absence.
- 2 retired employees returned on a 75-day temporary appointment – both are now ended.
- 13 positions are currently in various stages of the hiring process.
- 5 new job descriptions are currently under development to be completed and posted to fill in FY25.
- The agency headcount included in the approved FY25 budget allows for 66 employees.

PERSONNEL UPDATES SINCE SEPTEMBER QUARTERLY REPORT

- Headcount as of October 31st is 43, an increase of 3 employees from the last report. We have 1 new employee onboarding on November 18th and another internal employee has accepted a job offer to a different position with the agency to become effective November 16th.
- Our three newest employees started in October and if they successfully complete their probationary periods, they will become certified in March 2025.

DETAILED STATUS OF HIRING SEQUENCES CURRENTLY IN PROGRESS

1. Public Information/Communications Officer – Public Service Administrator “PSA” – This split-class position falls under the Administration Division and is high priority. The position’s job description has been developed and approved by CMS Classifications. This job has been excluded from the union. This position was posted in June and interviews are scheduled for mid-November.
2. Chief Certification Counsel – Public Service Administrator “PSA” Opt 8L 4d5 - A conditional job offer has been made and accepted and we are currently awaiting CMS acceptance of starting salary figure.

3. Assistant Certification Counsel – Sangamon County – Public Service Administrator “PSA” Opt 8L 4d5 - This high priority split-class position has been developed and approved. This position falls under the Legal Section of the Administration Division but will work closely with the Professional Standards Division in the waiver and hearing process. The position’s job description has been developed and approved by CMS Classifications. This job has been included in the AFSCME bargaining unit and preliminary work has begun to post the position before the December Board meeting.
4. Assistant Certification Counsel – Cook County – Public Service Administrator “PSA” Opt 8L 4d5 - This high priority split-class position has been developed and approved. This position falls under the Legal Section of the Administration Division but will work closely with the Professional Standards Division in the waiver and hearing process. The position’s job description has been developed and approved by CMS Classifications. This job has been included in the AFSCME bargaining unit and preliminary work has begun to post the position before the December Board meeting.
5. Assistant Fiscal Officer & Chief Accountability Officer - Senior Public Service Administrator “SPSA” – This high priority position falls under the Fiscal Section of the Operations Division and would oversee the grant section. This position was posted 10/10-25/24. Application final validation is currently underway, and it is anticipated that interviews will be conducted in late November or early December.
6. GATA/GATU Unit Supervisor – This position was originally planned to be classified as a Public Service Administrator “PSA”. However, upon discussion with CMS Labor, it has been decided to shift the classification to Executive II, which would be a bargaining unit-covered position. This position falls under the Fiscal Section of the Operations Division and would act as a lead worker/bargaining unit level supervisor to two Executive I grant-related positions. This position was posted on October 23rd through November 8th.
7. GATA/GATU Specialist – Executive I – This position falls under the Fiscal Section of the Operations Division and would process grant submissions for the various grant programs. This position was posted on October 25th through November 12th to hire six incumbents. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
8. Payroll/Timekeeper & Telecom Coordinator – Executive I – This position falls under the Fiscal Section of the Operations Division and would process payroll and timekeeping functions for the entire agency. This position was posted on October 18th through November 3rd. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
9. DEIA/EEO/AA Coordinator – Human Resources Specialist – This job description has been created and submitted to CMS Classifications for approval and upload into the Employee Central system for posting. We anticipate this position will be posted during the last half of November. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
10. Classifications, Transactions, Leave, & Recruiting Specialist – Human Resources Specialist – This job description has been created and submitted to CMS Classifications for approval and upload into the Employee Central system for posting. We anticipate this position will be posted during the second half of November. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
11. Benefits & Retirement Representative – Human Resources Representative – This job description has been created and submitted to CMS Classifications for approval and upload into the Employee Central system for posting. We anticipate this position will be posted during the last half of November. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
12. Special Projects & Policy Advisor – Senior Public Service Administrator “SPSA” – This position falls under the Operations Division. This job description has been created and submitted to CMS

Classifications for approval and upload into the Employee Central system for posting. We anticipate this position will be posted during the last half of November.

DETAILED STATUS OF REMAINING FY25 HIRING SEQUENCES PLANNED

13. Private Secretary II – Confidential Secretary – Cook – This existing position is 4d1 exempt and can be selected and appointed by the Executive Director as soon as he is ready to do so. Posting is not required for 4d1 positions.
14. Field Tech Support Specialist – Information Services Specialist “ISS” I – This position falls under the IT Section of the Administration Division and would provide tech support to external users of the agency applications. This job is in the process of being created and will be posted as soon as the job description is approved by CMS. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
15. Internal Tech Support Specialist – Information Services Specialist “ISS” I – This position falls under the IT Section of the Administration Division and would provide tech support to internal users of the agency systems, servers, and applications. This job is in the process of being created and will be posted as soon as the job description is approved by CMS. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
16. Investigations Manager - Public Service Administrator “PSA” – This split-class supervisory position falls under the Investigations Section of the Professional Standards Division and is a high priority. It is currently in the process of being developed and will be posted as soon as the job description is approved by CMS and union inclusion/exclusion is determined.

ONCE WE FILL THE POSITIONS ABOVE, WE WILL HAVE REACHED OUR FY25 HEADCOUNT LIMIT AND WILL NOT BE ABLE TO FILL ANY ADDITIONAL POSITIONS UNTIL FY26, which begins on July 1, 2025.

17. Curriculum Legal Specialist – Public Service Administrator “PSA” Opt 8L 4d5 – This high priority split-class position falls under the Legal Section of the Administration Division but works closely with the Basic Training Section. It is currently in the process of being developed and will be posted as soon as the job description is approved by CMS and union inclusion/exclusion is determined.
18. Manager of Basic and Part-Time Training – Public Service Administrator “PSA” – This split-class supervisory position falls under the Basic Training Section of the Training Division and is a high priority. It is currently in the process of being developed and will be posted as soon as the job description is approved by CMS and union inclusion/exclusion is determined.
19. Certification Manager - Public Service Administrator “PSA” – This split-class supervisory position falls under the Certification Section of the Professional Standards Division and is a high priority. It is currently in the process of being developed and will be posted as soon as the job description is approved by CMS and union inclusion/exclusion is determined.
20. Basic Law Enforcement (BLE) Curriculum Specialist – Executive II – This position falls under the Basic Training Section of the Training Division and will develop, maintain, and oversee the BLE curriculum. It is currently in the process of being developed and will be posted as soon as the job description is approved by CMS. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
21. Basic Correctional Officer & Court Security Officer (BCO/CSO) Curriculum Specialist – Executive II – This position falls under the Basic Training Section of the Training Division and will develop, maintain, and oversee the BCO & CSO curriculums. It is currently in the process of being developed and will be posted as soon as the job description is approved by CMS. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.

22. Academy Auditor – Executive II – This position falls under the Basic Training Section of the Training Division and will perform auditing functions of the ILETSB certified academies throughout the state. It is currently in the process of being developed and will be posted as soon as the job description is approved by CMS. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
23. Intake Specialist – Office Specialist – This position falls under the Professional Standards Division. It is currently in the process of being developed and will be posted as soon as the job description is approved by CMS. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
24. LHI & Crash Reconstruction Administrator – Executive I – This existing position falls under the Specialized Programs Section of the Training Division. This job has already been created and can be posted with only minimal formatting changes to accommodate the new system. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position. This position is under consideration for elimination – it has been moved to low priority until a decision is made.
25. Professional Standards Secretary – Executive Secretary I – This existing position falls under the Professional Standards Division and will be re-written to provide secretarial and administrative support for this division. This job can be posted with only minimal formatting changes to accommodate the new system. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position. This position has been moved to low priority until the Manager positions have been created and filled in Professional Standards.
26. Internal Auditor – This position is newly added to the hiring plan. It will fall under the Operations Division and Fiscal Section. It is yet to be determined what the classification and job details of this position will be, aside from its main duty of internal auditing. More details to come.

DIVERSITY, EQUITY, INCLUSION & ACCESSIBILITY (DEIA)

If any Board members have not yet taken their mandatory ***Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Accessibility Training*** and ***LGBTQIA+ Equity and Inclusion Training*** for 2024 on OneNet, please take a couple of hours to do so before the end of this month. If all staff and Board members have not completed the training by December 31st, we could receive an audit finding for our failure to do so.

Our agency's new DEIA FY25 Goals are due to be developed and submitted to the Governor's Office of Equity by November 22, 2024. A training session on the guidelines and procedures for submission was held on October 9th, to kick off the process.

HUMAN CAPITAL MANAGEMENT (HCM) PROJECT STATUS

There has been a considerable amount of work done in this new system since "go-live" on February 20th of this year. All of the agency data in the system has been reviewed and corrected at the agency level and with the assistance of our DoIT TOPS liaison. We have submitted all personnel transactions through June 30, 2024, so that the system could be "up to date" as of July 1, 2024, the beginning of FY25. Other agencies are still working on this process, which must be completed before automatic transactions can begin running in the system. Therefore, all agencies have been required to hold off on entering any transactions from July 1, 2024 onward. We are simply filing the transactions we will need to enter and will spend time getting them into the system once all agencies are caught up and the system is able to run all July 1st COLA's and monthly step progressions, step increases, longevity, and certifications automatically. Once those have started running in the system, all agencies will then be given the clearance to start entering the transactions with FY25 effective dates. At that stage, we should be able to use the system effectively going forward with no issues.

As a reminder, the Payroll, Time & Attendance, Learning Management, and Performance & Goal Management modules of the HCM project are expected to be rolled out at various times between now and the end of 2025. *(However, due to the extended timeframe due to the difficulties with the roll out of Employee Central, it would not be at all surprising if those additional modules are not added until a later date.)*

MISCELLANEOUS PROJECTS & REPORTS

The ILETSB **FY25 1st Quarter EEO/AA Report** was completed and submitted as required on October 18, 2024.

The ILETSB **FY24 Agency Workforce Annual Report** has been completed and is ready for submission to the Governor's office and Secretary of State in December as required.

QUARTERLY REPORT FOR THE DECEMBER 2024 BOARD MEETING

Nondiscretionary and Voluntary Decertification Cases

This is to report on officers who are subject to automatic decertification (50 ILCS 705/6.1) based upon a conviction or similar disposition, or a voluntary relinquishment of certification. Presented below are those matters of which the Board should be advised.

Automatic Decertification

1. **David Cornett (65019024)** is on inactive status having last separated from the Tilton Police Department on March 25, 2021. On August 23, 2024, Cornett pled guilty in Vermilion County to Theft in cause 2023CF162. On October 28, 2024, Cornett was sent written notice and an opportunity to respond to a request for his status be changed from inactive to decertified to his last known address; he did not respond.
2. **Kendrick Francisco (65031149)** is on inactive status having last separated from the Markham Police Department on August 17, 2023. On August 24, 2024, Francisco pled guilty in federal court to the equivalent of Perjury and judgement was entered in Federal Court, Northern District of Illinois in cause 2023CR451. On October 28, 2024, Francisco was sent written notice and an opportunity to respond to a request for his status be changed from inactive to decertified to his last known address; he did not respond.
3. **Alfred Olson (65125041)** is on inactive status, having last separated from the University of Chicago Police Department on May 17, 2021. Olson pled guilty to Felony Aggravated Battery in Cook County on September 5, 2024, in cause 22CR0561701. Olson was sent written notice and an opportunity to respond to a request for his status be changed from inactive to decertified to his last known address; he did not respond.
4. **Lorin Volberding (65006519)** is on inactive status, having last separated from the Chicago Police Department on June 23, 2006. Volberding was convicted of Murder in McHenry County on July 25, 2024, in cause 2017CF140. Volberding was sent written notice and an opportunity to respond to a request for his status be changed from inactive to decertified to his last known address; he did not respond.

Voluntary Relinquishments

1. **Jordan Miller (65145654)** is on inactive status having last separated from Belleville Police Department on May 1, 2024. Miller pled guilty in St. Clair County to Aggravated Assault in cause 2024CM97001 and agreed permanently forfeit his police certification.

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Basic Guidelines for Officer-Worn Body Cameras *Revised: December 2024*

Under the Law Enforcement Officer-Worn Body Camera Act, each agency which employs the use of officer-worn body cameras must adopt a written policy based upon the following guidelines. At a minimum, the agency policies must address the following and be compliant with the terms of 50 ILCS 706/10-20:

A. Operation:

(1) *If an officer is assigned to wear a body-worn camera, it must be turned on at all times when the officer is:*

(a) on-duty,

(b) visibly wearing:

1. any officially authorized uniform designated by a law enforcement agency, or,
2. articles of clothing, a badge, tactical gear, gun belt, a patch, or other insignia that he or she is a law enforcement officer acting in the course of his or her duties

(c) and is:

1. responding to calls for service, or
2. engaged in any law enforcement-related encounter or activity:
 - (i.) This includes, but is not limited to, traffic stops, pedestrian stops, arrests, searches, interrogations, investigations, pursuits, crowd control, traffic control, non-community caretaking interactions with an individual while on patrol, or any other instance in which the officer is enforcing the laws of the municipality, county, or State, but
 - (ii.) This does not include when the officer is completing paperwork alone, is participating in training in a classroom setting, or is only in the presence of only another law enforcement officer or officers.

(2) The officer must provide notice of recording, *verbal or otherwise*, to any person if the person has a reasonable expectation of privacy and proof of notice must be evident in the recording. If exigent circumstances exist which prevent the officer from providing notice, notice must be provided as soon as practicable.

(3) If exigent circumstances exist which prevent the camera from being turned on, the camera must be turned on as soon as practicable.

(4) Officer-worn body cameras may be turned off when the officer is inside of a patrol car which is equipped with a functioning in-car camera; however, the officer must turn on the camera upon exiting the patrol vehicle for law enforcement-related encounters. Officer-worn body cameras may be turned off when the officer is inside a correctional facility or courthouse which is equipped with a functioning camera system.

(5) Cameras must be turned off when:

(a) the victim of a crime requests that the camera be turned off, and unless impractical or impossible, that request is made on the recording;

(b) a witness of a crime or a community member who wishes to report a crime requests that the camera be turned off, and unless impractical or impossible that request is made on the recording; ~~or~~

(c) the officer is interacting with a confidential informant used by the law enforcement agency; ~~or~~

(d) an officer of the Department of Revenue enters a Department of Revenue facility or conducts an interview during which return information will be discussed or visible.

(6) An officer may continue to record or resume recording a victim or a witness, if exigent circumstances exist, or if the officer has reasonable articulable suspicion that a victim or witness, or confidential informant has committed or is in the process of committing a crime. Under these circumstances, and unless impractical or impossible, the officer must indicate on the recording the reason for continuing to record despite the request of the victim or witness.

(7) Cameras may be turned off when the officer is engaged in community caretaking functions. *This applies to any task undertaken by a law enforcement officer in which the officer is performing an articulable act unrelated to the investigation of a crime. "Community caretaking function" includes, but is not limited to, participating in town halls or other community outreach, helping a child find his or her parents, providing death notifications, and performing in-home or hospital well-being checks on the sick, elderly, or persons presumed missing.* "Community caretaking function" excludes law enforcement-related encounters or activities.

However, the camera must be turned on when the officer has reason to believe that the person on whose behalf the officer is performing a community caretaking function has committed or is in the process of committing a crime. If exigent circumstances exist which prevent the camera from being turned on, the camera must be turned on as soon as practicable.

B. Recording Capabilities:

(1) Cameras must be equipped with pre-event recording, capable of recording at least the 30 seconds prior to camera activation, unless the officer-worn body camera was purchased and acquired by the law enforcement agency prior to July 1, 2015.

(2) Cameras must be capable of recording for a period of 10 hours or more, unless the officer-worn body camera was purchased and acquired by the law enforcement agency prior to July 1, 2015.

C. Review:

~~For the purposes of redaction, labeling, or duplicating recordings, access to camera recordings shall be restricted to only those personnel responsible for those purposes. The recording officer and his or her supervisor may access and review recordings prior to completing incident reports or other documentation, provided that the officer or his or her supervisor discloses that fact in the report or documentation.~~

(1) For the purposes of redaction or duplicating recordings, access to camera recordings shall be restricted to only those personnel responsible for those purposes. The recording officer or his or her supervisor may not redact, duplicate, or otherwise alter the recording officer's camera

recordings. Except as otherwise provided in this Section, the recording officer and his or her supervisor may access and review recordings prior to completing incident reports or other documentation, provided that the supervisor discloses that fact in the report or documentation.

(2) A law enforcement officer shall not have access to or review his or her body-worn camera recordings or the body-worn camera recordings of another officer prior to completing incident reports or other documentation when the officer:

(a) has been involved in or is a witness to an officer-involved shooting, use of deadly force incident, or use of force incidents resulting in great bodily harm;

(b) is ordered to write a report in response to or during the investigation of a misconduct complaint against the officer.

(3) If the officer subject to subparagraph (i) prepares a report, any report shall be prepared without viewing body-worn camera recordings, and subject to supervisor's approval, officers may file amendatory reports after viewing body-worn camera recordings. Supplemental reports under this provision shall also contain documentation regarding access to the video footage.

(4) The recording officer's assigned field training officer may access and review recordings for training purposes. Any detective or investigator directly involved in the investigation of a matter may access and review recordings which pertain to that investigation but may not have access to delete or alter such recordings.

D. Retention:

(1) Recordings made on officer-worn cameras must be retained by the law enforcement agency or by the camera vendor used by the agency, on a recording medium for a period of 90 days.

(a) Under no circumstances shall any recording made with an officer-worn body camera be altered, erased, or destroyed prior to the expiration of the 90-day storage period.

~~*(b) If any data is altered, erased, or destroyed prior to the expiration of the 90-day storage period, the managing officer must complete an accidental deletion report indicating the name of the individuals involved, the dates of the recording, review and or deletion, the reason for the deletion, and any corrective actions taken as a result. This report must be reviewed and verified by a supervisor and the chief, sheriff or chief administrator. Any such reports must be included in the annual report provided to the Board.*~~

(b) In the event any recording made with an officer-worn body camera is altered, erased, or destroyed prior to the expiration of the 90-day storage period, the law enforcement agency shall maintain, for a period of one year, a written record including (i) the name of the individual who made such alteration, erasure, or destruction, and (ii) the reason for any such alteration, erasure, or destruction.

(c) Following the 90-day storage period, any and all recordings made with an officer-worn body camera must be destroyed, unless any encounter captured on the recording has been flagged. An encounter is deemed to be flagged when:

- (i) a formal or informal complaint has been filed;
- (ii) the officer discharged his or her firearm or used force during the encounter;
- (iii) death or great bodily harm occurred to any person in the recording;
- (iv) the encounter resulted in a detention or an arrest, excluding traffic stops which resulted in only a minor traffic offense or business offense;
- (v) the officer is the subject of an internal investigation or otherwise being investigated for possible misconduct;

- (vi) the supervisor of the officer, prosecutor, defendant, or court determines that the encounter has evidentiary value in a criminal prosecution; or
- (vii) the recording officer requests that the video be flagged for official purposes related to his or her official duties or believes it may have evidentiary value in a criminal prosecution.

(d) Under no circumstances shall any recording made with an officer-worn body camera relating to a flagged encounter be altered or destroyed prior to 2 years after the recording was flagged. If the flagged recording was used in a criminal, civil, or administrative proceeding, the recording shall not be destroyed except upon a final disposition and order from the court.

(2) Following the 90-day storage period, recordings may be retained if a supervisor at the law enforcement agency designates the recording for training purposes. If the recording is designated for training purposes, the recordings may be viewed by officers, in the presence of a supervisor or training instructor, for the purposes of instruction, training, or ensuring compliance with agency policies.

(3) Nothing in this Act prohibits law enforcement agencies from labeling officer-worn body camera video within the recording medium; provided that the labeling does not alter the actual recording of the incident captured on the officer-worn body camera. The labels, titles, and tags shall not be construed as altering the officer-worn body camera video in any way.

E. Purpose

(1) Recordings shall not be used to discipline law enforcement officers unless:

- (a) a formal or informal complaint of misconduct has been made;
- (b) a use of force incident has occurred;
- (c) the encounter on the recording could result in a formal investigation under the Uniform Peace Officers' Disciplinary Act; or
- (d) as corroboration of other evidence of misconduct.

(2) Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit or prohibit a law enforcement officer from being subject to an action that does not amount to discipline.

F. Care and Maintenance:

(1) The law enforcement agency shall ensure proper care and maintenance of officer-worn body cameras. Upon becoming aware, officers must as soon as practical document and notify the appropriate supervisor of any technical difficulties, failures, or problems with the officer-worn body camera or associated equipment.

(2) Upon receiving notice, the appropriate supervisor shall make every reasonable effort to correct and repair any of the officer-worn body camera equipment.

G. Public Recording:

(1) No officer may hinder or prohibit any person who is not a law enforcement officer, from recording a law enforcement officer in the performance of his or her duties in a public place or when the officer has no reasonable expectation of privacy.

(2) The law enforcement agency's written policy shall indicate the potential criminal penalties, as well as any departmental discipline, which may result from unlawful confiscation or destruction of the recording medium of a person who is not a law enforcement officer.

(3) However, an officer may take reasonable action to maintain safety and control, secure crime scenes and accident sites, protect the integrity and confidentiality of investigations, and protect the public safety and order.

H. Reporting

~~(1) Each law enforcement agency that employs the use of officer-worn body cameras must provide an annual report to the Board, on or before May 1 of the year.~~

~~(2) The report shall include:~~

~~(a) a brief overview of the makeup of the agency, including the number of officers utilizing officer-worn body cameras;~~

~~(b) the number of officer-worn body cameras utilized by the law enforcement agency;~~

~~(c) any technical issues with the equipment and how those issues were remedied;~~

~~(d) a brief description of the review process used by supervisors within the law enforcement agency;~~

~~(e) for each recording used in prosecutions of conservation, criminal, or traffic offenses or municipal ordinance violations:~~

~~(i) the time, date, location, and precinct of the incident;~~

~~(ii) the offense charged and the date charges were filed; and~~

~~(f) any other information relevant to the administration of the program.~~

~~(3) On or before July 30 of each year, the Board must analyze the law enforcement agency reports and provide an annual report to the General Assembly and the Governor.~~

Police Pursuit Guidelines



Pursuant to P.A. 88-637
Adopted 1994
Revised 12/2024

PREFACE

It is both the duty and obligation of responsible police officials to provide direction and guidelines to officers responsible for the capture of offenders attempting to evade the police with a motor vehicle. It is also imperative that standards designed to protect life and property be implemented statewide if the public is to be equally protected throughout Illinois. The Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board (Training Board) formally adopted the following Pursuit Guidelines. These recommended state standards meet the goal of providing criteria designed to maximize public safety under pursuit conditions.¹

PURPOSE

The purpose of the police pursuit guidelines is to provide a common set of standards for police agencies and their officers (to follow) throughout the State of Illinois. These guidelines are intended to help reduce the number of collision injuries and fatalities associated with pursuits within the state.

PRINCIPLES

The overriding responsibility of police agencies in the State of Illinois is to protect human life and property. When the risks to human life and/or property begin to outweigh the benefits of capture, officers should refrain or disengage from pursuits. The threat of injury, death, and property damage is borne by innocent bystanders, the peace officers involved in the pursuit, the fleeing driver and the occupants of the escaping vehicle. Therefore, it is the responsibility of agencies to establish pursuit guidelines designed to best protect human life and property and to provide peace officers guidance and training in the safe operation of police vehicles involved in pursuits.

RECOMMENDATION

It is both the duty and responsibility for police administrators to provide direction consisting of policy and procedure for officers within their command to assist in carrying out the responsibilities of their daily duties. As such, administrators responsible for supervision and direction should complete Vehicular Pursuit Management: Balancing Risks and Enhancing Safety on the COPS Training Portal located at: <https://learn.copstrainingportal.org/> Signup and login may be acquired at the same address.

DEFINITIONS

GENERAL TERMS:

Pursuit: An active attempt by a peace officer in an authorized marked emergency vehicle when emergency lights and siren are activated in-order to apprehend an actual or suspected law violator, is attempting to avoid apprehension through evasive maneuvers and tactics beyond a reasonable point at which a person should know they are being directed to stop.

Peace Officer: Any sworn peace officer as defined by Illinois Statute currently employed by a public safety agency.

¹ These guidelines are designed to inform the decisions of law enforcement agencies in the formulation of policies governing pursuits. They are not intended to create legal obligations or to be utilized by individual officers in performance of their duties.

- Supervisor/Officer in Charge:** A peace officer who, by virtue of rank or assignment, is responsible for the direction or supervision of the activities of other peace officers.
- Suspect:** Any person who a peace officer reasonably believes has committed an offense or poses an immediate threat to the safety of the public and/or other peace officers.
- ISPERN:** Illinois State Police Emergency Radio Network.
- Street Paralleling:** Driving a police vehicle on a street parallel to a street on which a pursuit is occurring. Paralleling involves monitoring radio traffic and geographical positioning but not pursuit.
- Trail or Trailing:** The unauthorized following of a pursuit at any distance, to include paralleling, intercepting, or tracking.
- Caravanning:** The practice of more than two cars pursuing a vehicle.
- Divided Highway:** A road which includes a physical barrier between traffic traveling in opposite directions.
- Terminate:** To abandon or abort the pursuit.
- Termination Point:** The location where the pursuit comes to a conclusion.

AUTHORIZED EMERGENCY VEHICLE:

Marked Police Vehicle: Any police vehicle that is identifiable by color scheme, red and/or blue lights permanently mounted on or within the vehicle, equipped with a siren, and has a department seal and/or police or sheriff lettering which a reasonable person knows to be a marked police vehicle.

Semi-Marked Police Vehicle: A vehicle that is not identifiably marked by a distinctive color scheme; red and/or blue lights may be mounted within the vehicle, equipped with siren, and could have partial police marking which a reasonable person would know is a police vehicle.

Unmarked Police Vehicle: A vehicle that has no distinctive identifiable marking but may have portable emergency warning lights.

VEHICLES ENGAGED IN PURSUIT:

Primary Unit: The police vehicle that initiates a pursuit or any unit that assumes control of the pursuit as the lead vehicle (the first police vehicle immediately behind the fleeing suspect).

Secondary Unit: Any police vehicle which becomes involved as a backup to the primary unit and follows the primary unit at a safe distance.

STATIONARY STOP TECHNIQUES:

Roadblock: A restriction or obstruction used or intended for the purpose of preventing free passage of motor vehicles on a roadway in order to affect the apprehension of a suspect. This includes placement of vehicles as well as use of devices to disable a vehicle.

MOBILE STOP TECHNIQUES:

Boxing In/Rolling Roadblock:
The surrounding of a suspect's moving vehicle with moving pursuit vehicles which are then slowed to a stop along with the suspect's vehicle.

FORCIBLE STOP TECHNIQUES:

Vehicle Contact Action (Ramming, Police Immobilization Technique):
Any action undertaken by the pursuing officer intended to result in contact between the moving police vehicle and the pursued vehicle.

Heading Off: An attempt to terminate a pursuit by pulling ahead of, behind or toward a suspect's moving vehicle to force it to the side of the road or to otherwise come to a stop.

PHASE ONE: INITIATION OF PURSUIT

Any peace officer in an authorized vehicle may initiate a pursuit when ALL of the following criteria are met:

1. The suspect is attempting to evade apprehension.
2. The suspect, if allowed to escape, may present a danger to human life or cause serious injury. 2

2 In implementing these guidelines, a jurisdiction needs to provide officers with guidance as to what type of conduct constitutes sufficient "danger to human life" to warrant pursuit. This guidance can be provided through specific written guidance and/or training.

PHASE TWO: FIELD OPERATIONS AND PURSUIT TACTICS

A. ENGAGEMENT:

1. No pursuits will be conducted with a police vehicle while providing transportation for any persons other than sworn law enforcement officers.
2. To reduce the likelihood of a pursuit occurring, a peace officer intending to stop a vehicle for any violation of the law, except a traffic law, shall, whenever possible and without creating a threat to public safety or peace officers, close the distance between the two vehicles prior to activating emergency lights, an audible device, or otherwise signaling the suspect to stop.
3. No more than two police vehicles (a Primary Unit and a Secondary Unit) shall become actively involved in a pursuit unless otherwise specifically directed by a supervisor.
4. Peace officers involved in a pursuit shall not proceed in a direction opposite to the flow of traffic on a divided highway without the specific authorization of a supervisor, if feasible.
5. Police units that are on a street parallel to a pursuit may not join or interfere with a pursuit unless specifically directed by a supervisor.
6. All units in a pursuit, whether the Primary or Secondary Unit, should be spaced sufficiently to successfully execute basic maneuvers.
7. Upon approaching an intersection controlled by traffic signals or signs, or any other location at which there is an increased likelihood of a collision, the driver of any pursuit vehicle shall, prior to entering the intersection, or upon the approach to any other such location where there is an increased likelihood of a collision, reduce the vehicle's speed so as to avoid a collision with another vehicle or pedestrian. Peace officers shall ensure that the way is clear before proceeding through an intersection or otherwise increasing speed. Pursuing peace officers are expected to maintain complete control of their vehicles at all times.
8. A motorcycle officer may initiate a pursuit, providing that the proper justification exists, but will relinquish Primary Unit status immediately upon the participation of a marked police vehicle. Upon relinquishing Primary Unit status, motorcycles shall terminate active involvement in a pursuit unless there are extremely exigent circumstances or are otherwise directed by a supervisor.
9. Semi-marked units may initiate a pursuit providing that the proper justification exists, but will relinquish Primary Unit status immediately

upon the participation of a marked police car. Upon relinquishing primary status, semi-marked units shall terminate active involvement in a pursuit unless they are needed to fulfill Secondary Unit responsibilities or are otherwise directed by a supervisor.

10. Unmarked or other departmental vehicles, except for marked, semi-marked and motorcycle units, may not initiate a pursuit without the authorization of a supervisor unless there is an imminent threat to life or great bodily harm represented by the continued freedom of the suspect.
11. Throughout the course of a pursuit, pursuing peace officers shall not attempt to overtake, pull alongside, or pass the suspect's moving vehicle without the specific authorization of a supervisor, if feasible. Peace officers shall not pass other units involved in a pursuit unless the passing peace officer receives specific permission from the Primary Unit.
12. Peace officers may use stationary stop techniques to terminate any pursuit so long as the technique is employed in a fashion that is not calculated to cause death or great bodily harm to persons in the pursued vehicle or others in the vicinity (i.e. the pursued vehicle has sufficient time and distance to stop before reaching the roadblock or the technology employed is designed to disable the vehicle without the loss of control). Where feasible, a peace officer should obtain authorization from a supervisor before implementing stationary stop techniques. Absent exigent circumstances, such techniques should not be employed by peace officers that have not been trained in application of the selected technique.
13. Peace officers may use mobile stop techniques to terminate any pursuit so long as the technique is employed in a fashion that is not calculated to cause death or great bodily harm to persons in the pursued vehicle or others in the vicinity. Where feasible, a peace officer should obtain authorization from a supervisor before implementing mobile stop techniques. Absent exigent circumstances, such techniques should not be employed by peace officers that have not been trained in application of the selected technique.
14. At low speeds [20 MPH or below], the use of forcible stop techniques is permitted when there is legal justification for the use of force. Where feasible, a peace officer should obtain authorization from a supervisor before implementing forcible stop techniques. Absent exigent circumstances, such techniques should not be employed by peace officers that have not been trained in application of the selected technique.
15. At high speeds [in excess of 20 MPH], the use of forcible stop techniques is permitted ONLY when there is legal justification for the use of deadly force. Where feasible a peace officer implementing forcible stop techniques. Absent exigent circumstances, such techniques should not be

employed by peace officers that have not been trained in application of the selected technique.

16. Peace officers involved in a pursuit shall not discharge any firearm from or at a moving vehicle, nor engage in any vehicle contact action except as a last resort to prevent imminent death or serious bodily injury to an officer or another person where deadly force would otherwise be legally justified. Where feasible, a peace officer should obtain authorization from a supervisor before discharging a weapon from or at a moving vehicle.

B. PRIMARY UNIT RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. The decision to initiate and/or continue a pursuit **REQUIRES** weighing the public safety need to immediately apprehend the suspect against the degree of risk to which peace officers and others are exposed as the result of a pursuit. Peace officers are reminded that they are under no legal obligation to initiate a pursuit, and that in many circumstances the safety of the public will dictate that no pursuit be initiated, and/or it be discontinued. Consideration should be given to the reason for pursuit of the fleeing vehicle, speed of the pursuit, the area of the pursuit, weather and road conditions, lighting and visibility, the presence of pedestrians and other traffic, the presence of passengers in the police or suspect vehicle, the presence or absence of audible or visible warnings, the relative performance capabilities of the pursuit vehicle and vehicle being pursued, known information on the suspect, available equipment, and officer training and experience.
2. Upon the initiation of a pursuit, the pursuing peace officer shall immediately activate the vehicle's emergency warning lights, audible device, and headlights if not already activated.

C. SECONDARY UNIT RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. A Secondary Unit shall notify the telecommunicator and supervisor, if feasible, that they have joined the pursuit. Until such time that a supervisor assumes responsibility, only one Secondary Unit shall become involved in an ongoing pursuit.
2. Upon being assigned Secondary Unit responsibilities, the vehicle's emergency warning lights, audible device, and headlights shall be activated.
3. Whenever practicable, the Secondary Unit shall assume the responsibility for ongoing pursuit telecommunications from the Primary Unit.
4. If so requested by the Primary Unit or if directed by a Supervisor to do so, the Secondary Unit may assume Primary Unit responsibilities. Otherwise,

the Secondary Unit may not attempt to overtake or pull alongside the Primary Unit.

5. Secondary Unit personnel are responsible for serving as a backup to the Primary Unit. As such, they will respond to directions from the Primary Unit personnel unless otherwise directed by a supervisor.

D. SUPERVISOR RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. Upon notification that a pursuit is in progress, the supervisor shall assume responsibility for the monitoring and control of the pursuit as it progresses.
2. The supervisor shall immediately determine whether the pursuit was initiated in accordance with the provisions of this guideline and shall permit the pursuit to be continued only if said guideline has been fully complied with to the best of the supervisor's knowledge.
3. Upon being notified of a pursuit, the supervisor shall verify the following:
 - a. That no more than the required or necessary number of units are involved in the pursuit;
 - b. That the proper radio frequency is being used;
 - c. That other agencies are notified as necessary and appropriate.
4. The supervisor shall continuously review the incoming information to determine whether the pursuit should be continued or terminated.
5. The supervisor shall order a pursuit terminated after concluding danger to the pursuing peace officers or the public outweighs the need for the immediate apprehension of the suspect.
6. The supervisor may order a pursuit terminated if the suspect's identity is established to the point where later apprehension is likely and there is no immediate threat to public safety.
7. The supervisor should order a pursuit terminated whenever the weather, road or traffic conditions substantially increase the danger to the public posed by the pursuit beyond the need for immediate apprehension.
8. The supervisor shall order a pursuit terminated whenever the distance between the pursuing and fleeing vehicles is so great that further pursuit is futile.

9. In controlling the pursuit, the supervisor shall be responsible for the coordination of the pursuit as follows:
 - a. Directing pursuit or support units into or out of the pursuit;
 - b. The assignment of a Secondary Unit to the pursuit;
 - c. The redesignation of Primary, Secondary, or other support units as necessary;
 - d. The approval, disapproval, and coordination of pursuit tactics;
 - e. The approval or disapproval to cross jurisdictional boundaries in the continuation of the pursuit;
 - f. Ensure compliance with interjurisdictional pursuit agreements.
10. The supervisor may approve and assign additional backup or support units to assist the Primary and Secondary Units based upon their analysis of:
 - a. The nature of the offense for which the pursuit was initiated;
 - b. The number of suspects and any known propensity for violence;
 - c. The number of peace officers in the pursuit vehicles;
 - d. Any damage or injuries to the assigned Primary or Secondary Units or peace officers;
 - e. The number of peace officers necessary to safely make an arrest at the conclusion of the pursuit;
 - f. Any other clear and articulable facts that would justify the increased hazards caused by adding more than the Primary and Secondary Units to a pursuit.
11. When the pursuit is terminated, the supervisor shall require that all participating agencies are notified, and identify an on scene supervisor or designee to monitor the arrest and transportation procedures.
12. The supervisor shall require throughout the duration of the pursuit that this guideline is followed by all peace officers.

E. OTHER UNIT RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. Unless otherwise directed, police units other than the Primary Unit and the first Secondary Unit shall not become involved in an ongoing pursuit.

2. Unless otherwise directed, police units other than the Primary Unit and the first Secondary unit shall not caravan and/or trail. Non-engaged police units are expected to monitor radio transmissions and to position themselves to be of possible assistance.

TELECOMMUNICATIONS

A. ENGAGED VEHICLE RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. Upon the initiation of a pursuit, the pursuing peace officer shall immediately or as soon as is reasonably practicable, notify telecommunications of the following information if available:
 - a. Notify the telecommunicator of pursuit in progress;
 - b. Advise location and direction of travel;
 - c. Give description of vehicle;
 - d. Give reason for pursuit;
 - e. Give estimated speed of fleeing vehicle;
 - f. Give number of occupants;
 - g. Give weather, road, and traffic conditions;
 - h. Identify other agencies involved in pursuit;
 - i. Advise when leaving jurisdiction.
2. The Primary Unit will provide telecommunications with frequent updates as to the location, direction of travel, and other pertinent information unless or until the Secondary Unit assumes responsibility for the telecommunication.
3. The Primary Unit is responsible for the conduct of the pursuit and in determining whether to continue or discontinue the pursuit unless otherwise directed by a supervisor.
4. The pursuing peace officer should keep windows rolled up and operate siren manually when possible, so that the telecommunicator can hear transmissions clearly.

B. TELECOMMUNICATOR:

1. Gives priority to Primary Unit;
2. Notifies other units of pursuit, including location, direction of travel, and vehicle description; also keeps a clear channel;
3. Notifies patrol supervisor if feasible;
4. Receives and records all incoming information on pursuit;
5. Keeps supervisor apprised of progress of pursuit,
6. Requests status when pursuing peace officer fails to make frequent contact;
7. Notifies neighboring jurisdictions of pursuit approaching their boundaries;
8. Performs relevant records and motor vehicle checks;
9. Coordinates and dispatches backup assistance and air support units under the direction of the supervisor.

C. RADIO FREQUENCY:

1. Pursuit communication will be handled on pursuing agencies' designated frequency, unless one or more of the following conditions exist; in that event, pursuit telecommunications should be handled on ISPERN:
 - a. Pursuit has or may extend into other jurisdictions.
 - b. The supervisor directs a switch to ISPERN.
2. Upon using the ISPERN frequency, the Primary Unit shall conform to ISPERN guidelines.

PHASE THREE: TERMINATION OF PURSUIT

A. PURSUING PEACE OFFICER(S) SHOULD TERMINATE PURSUITS WHEN:

1. The danger to the public or the pursuing peace officer outweighs the necessity for immediate apprehension of the suspect. Consideration should be given to the following conditions: speed of the pursuit, area of the pursuit, weather and road conditions, the presence of pedestrians and other traffic, the presence or absence of audible or visible warnings, and the reason for the pursuit of the fleeing vehicle, or;
2. The distance between the pursuing peace officer and the suspect is so great that further pursuit is futile, or;
3. The peace officer loses visual contact with the suspect for an extended period of time, or;
4. The suspect is identified and the failure to apprehend poses no immediate threat of death or serious injury to another person, or;
5. There are malfunctions with police equipment or the police vehicle (e.g., emergency lighting, siren) which make continued operation of the vehicle in a pursuit hazardous, or;
6. When ordered to do so by a supervisor.

B. INTERJURISDICTIONAL PURSUITS:

1. Pursuits entering another department's jurisdiction:
 - a. Primary Unit will advise a supervisor and telecommunications that the pursuit is leaving the original jurisdiction.
 - b. Supervisor will decide to continue or terminate pursuit based upon the existing circumstances.
 - c. Telecommunicator will notify the involved jurisdiction.
 - d. Peace officers will refrain from entering pursuits unless assistance from the pursuing agency is requested and such assistance is approved by a supervisor.
 - e. If two units from the other agency are actively involved in the pursuit, peace officers will not engage in the pursuit unless directed to do so by a supervisor.

2. Peace officers involved in interjurisdictional pursuits are required to comply with their department's guidelines and interjurisdictional agreements. Only pursuit tactics which are permitted by their own guidelines may be utilized, irrespective of what is requested by the other agency.

AGENCY REPORTING AND REVIEW PROCESS

- A. All agencies engaging in a pursuit will complete an appropriate report of the pursuit incident and assign a case reporting number to each pursuit incident. Agencies involved in interjurisdictional pursuits will obtain an ISPERN number in addition to their own case reporting number.
- B. All agencies should investigate pursuit incidents thoroughly. The acquisition of statements, photographs, drawings, preliminary medical reports and any other evidentiary items that are or could be relevant to the conduct of the pursuit incident should be completed.
- C. All agencies are requested to complete the "Pursuit Driving Report" (Appendix 1). The "Pursuit Driving Report" should be submitted through the agencies chain of command for internal evaluation and review to determine:
 1. Guideline compliance
 2. Operational needs
 3. Future training needs

REPORTING TO EXTERNAL AGENCY

- A. A "Pursuit Driving Report" will be submitted to the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board, 4500 South Sixth Street, Room 173, Springfield, Illinois 62703, by each agency involved in a pursuit.
- B. The Training and Standards Board will continue to compile, analyze, publish, and distribute to law enforcement, all data received from the reports.

50 **Section 1790.100 Applicability**

51
52 This Part shall apply to all administrative hearings concerning cases conducted under the
53 jurisdiction of the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board pursuant to Sections
54 6.3(h), 8.1(b), 8.2(b), and 8.3(c) of the Illinois Police Training Act [50 ILCS 705/6.3(h), 8.1(b),
55 8.2(b), and 8.3(c)].
56

57 **Section 1790.120 Definitions**

58
59 "Administrative Law Judge" or "ALJ" means an attorney licensed to practice law
60 in the State of Illinois who has been designated by the Director to conduct any
61 hearings governed by this Part.
62

63 "Board" means the Illinois Law Enforcement Training Standards Board as
64 established pursuant to Section 3(a) of the Police Training Act. [50 ILCS 705/3].
65

66 "Complaint" means a formal complaint described in Section 6.3(g) of the Illinois
67 Police Training Act.
68

69 "Complainant" means (i) the Board for hearings on formal complaints for
70 decertification; (ii) the officer or law enforcement agency contesting refusal of
71 reactivation; or (iii) the law enforcement agency contesting an emergency order of
72 suspension..
73

74 "Day" means a calendar day.
75

76 "Director" means the Executive Director of the Illinois Law Enforcement
77 Training Standards Board.
78

79 "Document" means pleading, notice, motion, affidavit, memorandum, brief,
80 petition, or other paper or combination of papers required or permitted to be filed.
81

82 "Evidence" means documents, objects, testimony and any other matter that is
83 considered evidence under the Illinois Rules of Evidence. [735 ILCS 5/Art. VIII].
84

85 "Hearing" means a formal proceeding in which the administrative law judge shall
86 report any findings of fact, conclusions of law, and recommended disposition. [50
87 ILCS 705/6.3].
88

89 "IAPA" means the Illinois Administrative Procedure Act. [5 ILCS 100].
90

91 "Panel" means the Illinois Law Enforcement Certification Review Panel as
92 created by the Illinois Police Training Act. [50 ILCS 705/3.1].

93
94 "Respondent" means: (i) the officer for hearings on formal complaints for
95 decertification; or (ii) the Board for hearings contesting refusal of reactivation and
96 emergency orders of suspension.

97
98 "Review Committee" means the Committee created under Section 3(a-5) of the
99 Illinois Police Training Act.

100
101 "Statement" means a written statement made by a witness and signed or otherwise
102 adopted or approved by the witness, or a stenographic, mechanical, electrical, or
103 other recording, or a transcription of the recording that is a substantially verbatim
104 recital of an oral statement made by the witness to an agent of the person obliged
105 to produce the statement and recorded contemporaneously with the making of this
106 oral statement.

107
108 **Section 1790.130 Burden and Standard of Proof**

109
110 The complainant shall have the burden of proof. The standard of proof for any hearing conducted
111 shall be by clear and convincing evidence.

112
113 **Section 1790.140 Filing and Service**

114
115 a) All pleadings, motions, briefs, and documents shall be electronically filed with the
116 Board in accordance with Supreme Court Rules 9 and 10. Service of such
117 pleadings, motions, briefs, and documents shall be made in accordance with
118 Supreme Court Rules 11 and 12., except as changed by these Rules For purposes
119 of these rules, the word "filing" shall mean "electronic filing", and the parties are
120 not required to file copies of any pleading, motion, brief or document that is
121 electronically filed.

122
123 b) The Panel shall cause a notice of the due date for an answer, the prehearing
124 conference date, and the hearing date before the ALJ and, for a complaint, the
125 additional notice requirements under Section 6.3(h)(1) of the Illinois Police
126 Training Act, to be served on the respondent in any manner authorized by the
127 Code of Civil Procedure or by subsection c).

128
129 c) By mail service:

130
131 1) The Panel may serve the respondent by certified mail, postage fully
132 prepaid:

133
134 A) Directed to the last known address of the respondent; or

135
136 B) To the last known email address respondent recorded with the
137 Board.

138

- 139 2) The Panel's certificate of mailing, emailing or delivery, or other service
140 affirmatively acknowledged by the respondent or counsel for the
141 Respondent is sufficient proof of service.

143 **Section 1790.150 Form of Papers Filed**
144

- 145 a) Documents shall clearly state a title for the proceedings in connection with which
146 they are filed. Documents shall be presented in letter-quality print of letter-sized
147 paper, and one copy of each document filed shall be signed by the party or by the
148 party's authorized representative.
149
- 150 b) Exhibits, when possible, shall be reduced or enlarged to conform to the size
151 requirements of subsection a). A party is not prohibited from enlarging an exhibit
152 at hearing for demonstrative purposes as long as the exhibit is reduced to the size
153 requirement in this subsection b) for the record.

- 155 c) One copy of each document filed shall be signed by the party or by the party's
156 authorized representative or attorney. All pleadings shall bear the business
157 address, e-mail address, fax number, if any, and telephone number of the attorney
158 filing the document, or of the party who appears on his or her own behalf.

160 **Section 1790.170 Prehearing Conference**
161

- 162 a) After an ALJ is assigned to the matter under Section 1790.450, a prehearing
163 conference shall be scheduled within 60 to 90 days of the assignment.

- 165 b) Upon the request of any party, the prehearing conference shall be conducted as a
166 matter of record.
167
- 168 c) The purposes of the prehearing conference include:
169
- 170 1) Simplification of issues;

- 172 2) Limitation of issues;
173
- 174 3) Negotiating admissions or stipulations;
175
- 176 4) Limitation of witnesses or evidence;
177
- 178 5) Exchange of exhibits;
179
- 180 6) Discussion of any other matter that may aid in efficient disposition of the
181 case;
182
- 183 7) Agreed dispositions; or
184

- 185 8) Joinder.
186
187 d) The parties shall be fully prepared to participate in a prehearing conference,
188 which shall include:
189
190 1) Presentation of any prehearing motions;
191
192 2) Witness and exhibit lists that list only those witnesses the party in good
193 faith intends to call;
194
195 3) Disclosure of expert witnesses; and
196
197 4) Any other materials directed by an ALJ.
198
199 e) Any expert witnesses and expert opinions not listed or disclosed in the prehearing
200 conference must be disclosed in accordance with Section 1790.410(b) and
201 disclosed no later than 30 days before the hearing.
202

203 **Section 1790.200 Notice of Prehearing Conference**
204

- 205 a) All Prehearing Conferences shall be initiated by the issuance of a written Notice
206 of Prehearing Conference, which shall be served upon all known parties as
207 provided in Section 1790.140. Hearings relating to discretionary decertification or
208 an emergency order of suspension [50 ILCS 705/6.3 & 8.3] shall take priority
209 over all other hearings.
210
211 b) Service shall be complete when the Notice of Prehearing Conference is served
212 parties as provided in Section 1790.140.
213
214 c) A Notice of Prehearing Conference served under this Section shall include:
215
216 1) Time, place and nature of the Prehearing Conference;
217
218 2) The legal authority and jurisdiction under which the hearing is to be held;
219
220 3) A reference to the particular Section of the statutes and rules involved; and
221
222 4) A short and plain statement of the matters asserted, except when a more
223 detailed statement is otherwise provided for by law.
224

225 **Section 1790.210 Appearance**
226

- 227 a) A party may be represented by an attorney who is licensed in Illinois or by an
228 attorney otherwise permitted by law to practice in the State. Attorneys who
229 appear in a representative capacity must file written notice of appearance setting
230 forth:

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- 1) The name, address, email address, telephone number and Supreme Court registration number of the attorney;
 - 2) The name, address and email address of the party represented; and
 - 3) An affirmative statement indicating that the attorney is licensed in Illinois or is appearing pro hac vice.
- b) An attorney may withdraw upon written notice to the ALJ.
- c) A law student licensed under Supreme Court Rule 711 may appear on behalf of any party as permitted by Supreme Court Rule 711 and shall be subject to the same requirements as an attorney.
- d) Attorneys admitted to practice in states or jurisdictions other than the State of Illinois may appear and be heard in a specific hearing pro hac vice as authorized and in compliance with Supreme Court Rule 707. The attorney's appearance shall include documentation as to his or her eligibility or qualification under Supreme Court Rule 707.
- e) Any individual may appear on his or her own behalf.
- f) Once an appearance is filed, a copy of all future filings shall be served upon the counsel of record, unless that counsel has withdrawn.
- g) The standard of conduct shall be the same as before the Courts of Illinois. Attorneys appearing before the ALJ shall conform their conduct to the Illinois Rules of Professional Conduct. Any failure to behave in a manner consistent with those standards of conduct or this Part authorizes an ALJ to take the following actions:
- 1) Limitation of evidence;
 - 2) Substitution of written argument in place of oral argument; or
 - 3) If warranted, report an attorney's misbehavior to the Attorney Registration and Disciplinary Commission of the Illinois Supreme Court.
- h) If any of the actions authorized by subsection g) are taken by the ALJ, it shall be done as a matter of record, and the ALJ shall state for the record the specific reasons for the action.
- i) A party sanctioned under this Section may request the decision be reviewed by the Director.

277 **Section 1790.250 Failure to Appear**

278

279 Absent a compelling reason, failure to appear at the time and place set for hearing shall be
280 deemed a waiver of the right to present evidence unless otherwise reflected by order of the ALJ.
281 After presentation by the Board of proof that the complainant or respondent, as applicable, was
282 given proper notice, the ALJ shall make his or her recommendation.

283

284 **Section 1790.260 Amendment and Withdrawal of Complaints**

285

286 a) The complaint may be amended at any time, except in the course of the hearing
287 without leave or approval of the ALJ. If an amended complaint is filed during the
288 course of the hearing, it shall also be presented to the ALJ. A continuance shall be
289 granted whenever the amendment materially alters the complaint and when the
290 respondent demonstrates that he or she would otherwise be unable to properly
291 prepare an answer to the amended complaint. Documents received pursuant to 50
292 ILCS 705/9.2 shall be submitted under seal and not subject to FOIA until the
293 matter leads to decertification.

294

295 b) The Board may withdraw a complaint or a complainant may withdraw a request
296 for a hearing on an emergency order of suspension or denial of recertification at
297 any time prior to the hearing. After a hearing has begun, a complaint or a request
298 for a hearing may be withdrawn only with leave of the ALJ.

299

300 **Section 1790.300 Answer**

301

302 a) Any party receiving a complaint and Notice of Hearing shall file a written answer
303 to the complaint no later than 30 days after receiving the complaint and Notice of
304 Hearing. The respondent shall specifically admit, deny or explain each of the
305 facts alleged in the complaint. However, if the respondent is without knowledge,
306 the respondent shall so state and that statement operates as a denial. All
307 allegations in the complaint, if no answer is filed, or any allegation in the
308 complaint not specifically denied or explained in an answer filed, unless the
309 answer states that the respondent is without knowledge, shall be deemed to be
310 admitted to be true and shall be so found by the ALJ, unless good cause to the
311 contrary is shown.

312

313 b) An original and one copy of the answer shall be filed with the ALJ and Panel.
314 Immediately upon the filing of the answer, the responding party shall serve a copy
315 on the Director and other party. A party who is not represented by an attorney
316 shall sign his or her answer and state his or her address. Except when otherwise
317 specifically provided by rule or statute, an answer need not be verified or
318 accompanied by affidavit. The signature of the attorney or non-attorney party
319 constitutes a certificate by him or her that he or she has read the answer; that, to
320 the best of his or her knowledge, information and belief, there is good ground to
321 support it; and that it is not interposed for delay. If an answer is not signed or is
322 signed with intent to defeat the purpose of this Section, it may be stricken as a

323 sham and false and the action may proceed as though the answer had not been
324 served.

325
326 c) The ALJ before whom the hearing is scheduled may by written order extend the
327 time within which the answer shall be filed.

328
329 **Section 1790.310 Motions**

330
331 a) All motions made before or during a hearing shall be made to the ALJ and, unless
332 made orally on the record during a hearing or unless the ALJ directs otherwise, a
333 motion shall be in writing and shall be accompanied by any affidavits or other
334 evidence relied upon and, when appropriate, by a proposed order. Two copies of
335 all motions shall be filed with the ALJ, and at least one copy shall be served on
336 each additional party, if any, to the hearing.

337
338 b) Within seven days after service of a written motion or other document, or other
339 period as the ALJ may allow, a party may file a response in support of or in
340 opposition to the motion and, if necessary, accompanied by affidavits or other
341 evidence. A party filing a motion has the right to request from the ALJ leave to
342 file a reply to a response.

343
344 c) A written brief may be filed with a motion or an answer to a motion stating the
345 arguments and authorities relied upon. The brief may not be longer than 15 pages
346 in length unless, prior to the filing date, leave is granted to file a brief greater than
347 15 pages.

348
349 d) A written motion filed prior to a hearing shall be disposed of by written order and
350 on notice of all parties, except for motions made at or after the opening of a
351 hearing, in which case the ALJ shall announce his or her ruling orally on the
352 record at the hearing. All motions, rulings and orders shall become a part of the
353 record, except that ruling on motions to revoke subpoenas shall become a part of
354 the record only upon the request of the party aggrieved. Rulings by the ALJ on
355 motions or objections, and orders in connection with those motions or objections,
356 shall not be appealed directly to the Panel but shall be considered by the Panel in
357 reviewing the record if exception to the ruling or order is included in the
358 statement of exceptions filed with the Panel pursuant to Sections 120.645 and
359 120.650.

360
361 e) The ALJ shall rule upon all motions, except that the ALJ shall have no authority
362 to dismiss or decide a hearing on the merits without granting all parties to the
363 proceeding a right to be heard in accordance with the procedures for motions in
364 this Section, which shall constitute the record.

365
366 f) Unless otherwise ordered, the filing of an answer or motion shall not stay the
367 proceeding or extend the time for the performance of any act.

368

- 369 g) A party has a right to file an emergency motion setting forth why an emergency
370 exists and the ALJ can deny the emergency motion solely on the basis that the
371 motion did not demonstrate that an emergency exists.
372

373 **Section 1790.320 Joinder of Complaints**
374

375 If the two or more instances of conduct that would be deemed a violation of the Illinois Police
376 Training Act for decertification are known to the Board at the time of commencing the case,
377 filing a complaint with the Panel, all known instances of conduct that would be deemed a
378 violation of the Illinois Police Training Act shall be included in the formal complaint filed with
379 the Panel and heard in a single hearing.
380

381 **Section 1790.330 Postponement or Continuance of Hearing**
382

383 A hearing may be postponed or continued for due cause by the ALJ upon his or her own motion
384 or upon the motion of a party to the hearing. A motion by a party shall set forth facts
385 demonstrating that the request for continuance is not for the purposes of delay. Examples of due
386 cause include the unavailability of the ALJ, a witness, or a party due to an accident, illness, or
387 other circumstances beyond the person's control. Notice of any postponement or continuance
388 shall be given in writing to all parties to the hearing within a reasonable time in advance of the
389 previously scheduled hearing date. All parties involved in a hearing shall attempt to avoid undue
390 delay caused by repetitive postponements or continuances so that the subject matter of the
391 hearing may be resolved expeditiously.
392

393 **Section 1790.400 Remote Proceedings**
394

- 395 a) By order of the ALJ, any status hearing or prehearing may be conducted remotely,
396 either by teleconference or videoconference. The parties shall be provided
397 instructions for accessing the teleconference or videoconference system for the
398 date and time of the scheduled status hearing or prehearing.
399
- 400 b) The parties may agree that the hearing will be conducted in its entirety by
401 teleconference or videoconference or that a part or parts of the hearing will be
402 conducted by teleconference or videoconference, including the testimony of a
403 particular witness or witnesses. These agreements are subject to the approval of
404 the ALJ by entry of an order. Absent such agreement, the hearings shall be
405 conducted in person at the Board's office.
406

407 **Section 1790.410 Discovery**
408

- 409 a) The parties may exchange known documents, including any written statements or
410 expert opinions, before the prehearing conference, however general discovery
411 (e.g., deposition, interrogatories, or request to produce or admit) shall not be
412 permitted.
413

414 b) Disclosure of the following shall be required in accordance with the time periods
415 set forth in this subsection (b) unless otherwise modified by the ALJ in the order
416 issued pursuant to the prehearing conference:

417
418 1) Unless otherwise ordered by the ALJ at least 21 days prior to the
419 commencement of the hearing, each party shall provide all parties with a
420 copy of any document that it may offer into evidence, including any
421 statements as defined by Section 1790.120. This subsection (b)(1) does
422 not require any party to provide copies of documents already provided.
423 Each party shall provide newly discovered documents as they become
424 known to the party intending to introduce the document.

425
426 2) Unless otherwise ordered by the ALJ at least 21 days prior to the
427 commencement of the hearing, each party shall provide all parties with a
428 list containing the name and address of any witness who may be called to
429 testify. Each party shall provide newly discovered witnesses as they
430 become known to the party intending to call the witness.

431
432 **Section 1790.420 Subpoenas**

433
434 a) The Director shall, on the written application of any party, issue subpoenas to a
435 party allowing that party to require the attendance and testimony of witnesses and
436 the production of any evidence, including books, records, correspondence or
437 documents. Applications for subpoenas shall be filed with the ALJ. Applications
438 for subpoenas may be made ex parte. The subpoena shall show on its face the
439 name and address of the party at whose request the subpoena was issued.

440
441 b) Subpoenas may be served by personal delivery, by certified mail with return
442 receipt signed by private delivery service, or by U.S. regular mail, postage
443 prepaid. Any person served with a subpoena, whether ad testificandum (for
444 witness testimony) or duces tecum (for document production), who does not
445 intend to comply with the subpoena, shall, within 5 days after the date of service
446 of the subpoena, petition in writing to revoke the subpoena. The date of service
447 for purposes of computing the time for filing a petition to revoke shall be the date
448 the subpoena is received. All petitions to revoke subpoenas shall be served on the
449 party at whose request the subpoena was issued. The petition to revoke, if made
450 prior to or during the hearing, shall be filed with the ALJ.

451
452 c) The ALJ, upon motion made promptly and, in any event, at or before the time
453 specified in the subpoena for compliance, may quash or modify the subpoena if it
454 is unreasonable, is oppressive, or requests material that is irrelevant. The ALJ
455 shall rule upon motions to quash or modify material requested in the subpoena.
456 The ALJ may deny, limit, or condition the production of information when
457 necessary to prevent undue delay, undue expense, harassment, or oppression. The
458 ALJ can take these actions if the subpoena does not describe with sufficient
459 particularity the evidence whose production is required; or if, for any other reason

460 sufficient in law, the subpoena is otherwise invalid. The ALJ can also take these
461 actions to protect materials from disclosure consistent with a protective order
462 issued by the ALJ. If the Request for Subpoena is denied or modified, the ALJ
463 shall proceed to conduct the hearing, and the specific reasons for denying or
464 modifying the request shall be made part of the record.
465

466 d) If a party or organization within control of a party fails to obey a subpoena, and
467 the ALJ finds the subpoena to have been validly served and the material requested
468 to be relevant and material, the ALJ may impose such sanctions as are
469 appropriate, including, but not limited to: prohibiting testimony by the party who
470 has refused to comply with the subpoena; drawing an adverse inference against
471 the party required to comply; or recognizing the evidence required by the
472 subpoena but not produced as establishing the truth of the position of the party
473 who subpoenaed the document. If a nonparty fails to obey a subpoena, the party
474 seeking enforcement shall be responsible for preparing an application for
475 enforcement and shall file it in circuit court.
476

477 e) Witnesses summoned before the ALJ, other than those summoned by the Board
478 shall be paid the same fees and mileage that are paid witnesses in the court of the
479 county where the hearing is being held. Witness fees and mileage shall be paid by
480 the party at whose instance the witnesses appear.
481

482 **Section 1790.450 Administrative Law Judge**

483
484 The Board shall retain at least two attorneys, licensed to practice in Illinois, to serve as ALJ on
485 behalf of the Board. Each case will be assigned an ALJ based upon a rotation determined by the
486 ALJs, which may include criteria based upon the location of the hearings and permanent
487 assignments of ALJs to those locations. The ALJ shall conduct the hearing, question witnesses,
488 make rulings on motions and objections, and submit Findings of Fact, Conclusions of Law, and
489 his or her recommendation to the Panel.
490

491 **Section 1790.500 Authority of Administrative Law Judge**

492
493 An ALJ presiding over a hearing has all powers necessary and appropriate to conduct a full, fair,
494 and impartial hearing, including the following:
495

- 496 a) To administer oaths and affirmations;
497
498 b) To rule upon offers of proof and receive relevant evidence;
499
500 c) To issue subpoenas as provided in Section 1790.420;
501
502 d) To rule on issues relating to document exchanges;
503
504 e) To regulate the course of the hearing and the conduct of the parties and their
505 counsel;

- 506
507 f) To consider and rule upon procedural requests;
508
509 g) To hold conferences for the settlement or simplification of the issues;
510
511 h) To examine witnesses and direct witnesses to testify, limit the number of times
512 any witness may testify, limit repetition or cumulative testimony, and set
513 reasonable limits on the amount of time each witness may testify; and
514
515 i) To make decisions in accordance with the appropriate laws and rules, including
516 this Part and the Illinois Administrative Procedure Act.
517

518 **Section 1790.510 Ex Parte Communications**
519

- 520 a) No party may engage in any ex parte communication with an ALJ or with any
521 member of the Board regarding matters pending before an ALJ. However, a party
522 not represented by an attorney or attorney for a party may engage in
523 communications with the other party (if not represented by an attorney) or
524 attorney for a party outside the presence of the ALJ.
525
526 b) The ALJ shall not initiate ex parte communications, directly or indirectly, in any
527 matter in connection with any substantive issue, with any interested person or
528 party. If the ALJ receives any such ex parte communication, including any
529 documents, he or she shall inform the other party of the substance of any such oral
530 communication or documents. The other party shall be given an opportunity to
531 review any such ex parte communication.
532
533 c) Nothing shall prevent the ALJ from communicating ex parte about routine matters
534 such as requests for continuances or opportunities to inspect the file as long as all
535 parties are informed of the substance of the ex parte communication. The date and
536 type of communication, the persons involved, and the results of such routine
537 communications shall be part of the record.
538

539 **Section 1790.520 Disqualification of Administrative Law Judge**
540

541 At any time prior to the issuance of the ALJ's decision or recommendations, a party may move to
542 disqualify the ALJ on the grounds of bias or conflict of interest. The motion shall be made in
543 writing to the Panel, with a copy to the Director and the ALJ, setting out the specific instances of
544 bias or conflict of interest. The Panel shall assign the matter for a determination to an ALJ not
545 challenged in the motion. An adverse decision or ruling, in and of itself, is not grounds for
546 disqualification. The ALJ's employment or contract as an ALJ by the Board is not, in and of
547 itself, a conflict of interest. The case shall be suspended until a neutral ALJ rules on the motion.
548 The neutral ALJ may decline to disqualify the presiding ALJ or appoint another ALJ to hear the
549 case.
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551 **Section 1790.530 Willfully Disobedient Conduct**

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- a) Willfully Disobedient conduct at any hearing before the ALJ shall be grounds for exclusion from the hearing.
- b) If a witness or a party refuses to answer a question after being directed to do so or refuses to obey an order to provide documents, the ALJ may make orders with regard to the refusal as are just and appropriate, including, but not limited to, excluding the testimony of witnesses, entering an order of default, entering an order that certain facts are deemed admitted for purpose of the proceeding, or entering an order denying the application or complaint of a party.

Section 1790.545 Settlement Agreements

The ALJ may not change, amend, or modify a settlement agreement of the parties to the proceeding.

Section 1790.550 Conduct of Hearings

- a) All hearings shall be public unless required by statute to be otherwise.
- b) The sequence to be followed for all cases is as follows:
 - 1) Prehearing Conference. The purpose is to set a date on which all parties expect to be prepared to proceed with their cases, and to rule on any preliminary motions that are presented.
 - 2) Hearings.
 - A) Preliminary Matters – Motions, attempts to narrow issues or limit evidence.
 - B) Opening Statements – The party bearing the burden of proof proceeds first.
 - C) Case in Chief – Evidence is presented by the party bearing the burden of proof. Once a witness' direct testimony is completed, that witness is subject to cross-examination and redirect.
 - D) Defense – Evidence may be presented by the opposing party in the same manner as the case in chief.
 - E) Closing Statements – The party bearing the burden of proof proceeds first, then the opposing party, then a final word by the party bearing the burden of proof.

- 597 c) After the hearing is concluded, the ALJ shall prepare a written decision, including
598 findings of fact, conclusions of law, and recommended disposition to the Panel as
599 provided in Section 1790.630.
600
- 601 d) Documents received pursuant to 50 ILCS 705/9.2 shall be submitted under seal
602 and not subject to disclosure under the Freedom of Information Act until the
603 matter leads to decertification.
604

605 **Section 1790.560 Rules of Evidence**
606

- 607 a) The Illinois Rules of Evidence shall apply to the extent practicable unless, by such
608 application, the ALJ determines that application of the rule would be an injustice
609 or preclude the introduction of evidence of the type commonly relied upon by a
610 reasonably prudent person in the conduct of his or her affairs. The ALJ must state
611 on the record his or her reasons for that determination. Any objection with
612 respect to the conduct of the hearing, including any objection to the introduction
613 of evidence, may be stated orally, accompanied by a short statement of the
614 grounds for the objection, and included in the record. No objection shall be
615 deemed waived by further participation in the hearing.
616
- 617 b) The ALJ may, on his or her own initiative or at the request of any party or
618 witness, enter a protective order to prevent exposure in the public domain of
619 records or other information that is of a sensitive or confidential nature.
620
- 621 c) Evidence of any misconduct is admissible for its bearing on any matter to which it
622 is relevant, including the officer's history of conduct as described in 50 ILCS
623 705/6.3(b).
624

625 **Section 1790.570 Official Notice**
626

627 Official notice may be taken of any material fact not appearing in evidence in the record if the
628 Circuit Courts of this State could take judicial notice of the fact. In addition, notice may be taken
629 of generally recognized technical or scientific facts within the Board's specialized knowledge.
630 Parties shall be notified of the taking of official notice either before or during the hearing or by
631 reference in preliminary reports or otherwise of the material noticed, including any staff
632 memoranda or data, and they shall be afforded an opportunity to contest the facts noticed. The
633 Board's expertise, technical competence, and specialized knowledge may be utilized in the
634 evaluation of the evidence.
635

636 **Section 1790.580 Hostile or Adverse Witnesses**
637

- 638 a) If the ALJ determines that a witness is hostile, unwilling, or adverse, he or she
639 may be examined by the party calling him or her as if under cross-examination.
640

- 641 b) The party calling an occurrence witness, upon the showing that he or she called
642 the witness in good faith and is surprised by his or her testimony, may impeach
643 the witness by proof of prior inconsistent statements.
644

645 **Section 1790.590 Documents**

- 646 a) Business records are admissible in a hearing. A business record must be:
647 1) Relevant;
648 2) A memorandum, report, record, or data compilation;
649 3) Made by a person with first-hand knowledge of the facts or from
650 information transmitted by a person with knowledge of those matters;
651 4) Made at or near the time of the facts;
652 5) Made as part of the regular practice of the activity; and
653 6) Kept in the course of regularly conducted activity.
654 b) Any party may prove elements (a)(3) through (a)(6) by presentation of a sworn
655 statement by an individual responsible for making or keeping those records.
656 c) Any party seeking introduction of a document shall be allowed to offer a
657 mechanical reproduction or photocopy of the original without any showing that
658 the original is unavailable, upon representation of the party or attorney that the
659 copy is a fair and accurate copy of the original.
660
661

662 **Section 1790.600 Default**

663 Failure of a party to appear at the hearing or failure to proceed as ordered by the ALJ shall
664 constitute a default. The ALJ shall enter the appropriate default order.
665

666 **Section 1790.610 Record in Cases**

- 667 a) A full and complete record shall be kept of all proceedings. The record shall
668 consist of the following:
669 1) All pleadings, including all notices and responses to those pleadings;
670 2) An electronic recording of the hearing, a transcript of the hearing, if any,
671 and all evidence received, except that the ALJ may issue a protective order
672 preventing public release of any recording, transcript, or evidence as provided in
673 Section 1790.560(b);
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- 687 3) A statement of matters officially noticed;
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689 4) Any offers of proof, objections to that proof, and rulings on that proof;
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691 5) Any proposed findings and conclusions;
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693 6) Any decision, opinion, or recommendations by the ALJ; and
694
695 7) Any ex parte communication prohibited by Section 10-60 of the IAPA, but
696 those communications shall not form the basis for any finding of fact.
697
698 b) The record shall also contain the following:
699
700 1) Subpoenas;
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702 2) Requests for Subpoenas;
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704 3) Cover letters;
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706 4) Notices of Filing; and
707
708 5) Certificates of mailing for regular mail and return receipts for certified
709 mail.

711 c) The Board shall be the official custodian of the records of administrative hearings
712 held by the Board.
713

714 **Section 1790.620 Briefs**

715
716 The ALJ may require or allow parties to submit written briefs to the ALJ within 15 days after the
717 close of the hearing or other reasonable time as the ALJ shall determine. Briefs shall be limited
718 to 15 pages, unless permission is granted by the ALJ.
719

720 **Section 1790.630 Administrative Law Judge's Decision**

- 721
722 a) No later than 60 days following the hearing, the ALJ shall issue a decision in
723 writing and include findings of fact, conclusions of law, and recommended
724 disposition to the Panel. The findings of fact shall be based exclusively on the
725 evidence presented at hearing or known to all parties, including matters officially
726 noticed. A copy of the recommendation shall be delivered or mailed to the Panel,
727 each party of record, and to each attorney of record.
728
729 b) If the ALJ finds that no allegations supporting one or more charges of misconduct
730 are proven by clear and convincing evidence, then the ALJ shall recommend to
731 the Panel that the complaint be dismissed, recommend to the Panel reactivation of
732 the officer, or reverse or reduce the emergency order of suspension. If the ALJ

733 finds that the allegations supporting one or more charges of misconduct are
734 proven by clear and convincing evidence, then the ALJ shall recommend
735 decertification, recommend no reactivation, or sustain the emergency order of
736 suspension.
737

738 **Section 1790.645 Illinois Law Enforcement Certification Review Panel**
739

- 740 a) Upon receipt of the ALJ's finding of fact, conclusions of law, and recommended
741 disposition, and any submitted objections from the officer or Board, the Panel
742 shall call for a certification review meeting or, after receiving the ALJ's decision
743 on an emergency order of suspension, a meeting relating to the emergency order
744 of suspension.
745
- 746 b) The Panel shall consider the hearing officer's findings of fact, conclusions of law,
747 recommended disposition, and any submitted objections, may deliberate on all
748 evidence and testimony received, and may consider the weight and credibility to
749 be given to the evidence received. No new or additional evidence may be
750 presented to the Panel.
751
- 752 c) If a simple majority of the Panel finds that no allegations supporting one or more
753 charges of misconduct are proven by clear and convincing evidence, then the
754 Panel shall recommend to the Board that the complaint be dismissed, recommend
755 to the Board reactivation of the officer, or reverse or reduce the emergency order
756 of suspension. If a simple majority of the Panel finds that the allegations
757 supporting one or more charges of misconduct are proven by clear and convincing
758 evidence, then the Panel shall recommend decertification, recommend no
759 reactivation, or sustain the emergency order of suspension.
760
- 761 d) The Panel shall prepare a summary report as soon as practicable after the
762 completion of the meeting including the following: the hearing officer's findings
763 of fact, conclusions of law, recommended disposition, and the Panel's order.
764

765 **Section 1790.650 Final Action by the Board**
766

767 Upon receipt of the Panel's order and recommendation relating to a complaint or a reactivation
768 refusal, the Board, by majority vote, finds that no allegations supporting one or more charges of
769 misconduct are proven by clear and convincing evidence, then the Board shall order the
770 complaint be dismissed or reactivation of the officer. If the Board, by majority vote, finds that
771 the allegations supporting one or more charges of misconduct are proven by clear and convincing
772 evidence, then the Board shall confirm the decertification or denial of reactivation. If the Board
773 makes a final decision contrary to the recommendations of the Panel, the Board shall set forth a
774 final written decision with specific reasons for not following the Panel's recommendations. A
775 copy of the Board's final decision also shall be delivered to the last employing law enforcement
776 agency, the complainant (if not the Board), and the Panel.
777

778 **Section 1790.660 Reconsideration of Board's Decision**

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- a) Within 30 days after service of the Board's final decision under Section 1790.650, the Panel or the law enforcement officer may file a written motion for reconsideration and supporting brief with the Review Committee. The motion for reconsideration shall specify the particular grounds for reconsideration.
- b) The non-moving party may respond to the motion for reconsideration within 21 days. The Review Committee shall only address the issues raised by the parties.
- c) Briefs. Each brief shall:
 - 1) Set forth specifically the questions of procedure, fact, law or policy to which objection is made;
 - 2) Identify that part of the ALJ's decision to which objection is made;
 - 3) Designate by precise citation of page the portions of the record relied on;
 - 4) Concisely state the grounds for the objection;
 - 5) Be limited to 15 pages;
 - 6) include a specification of the questions involved and to be argued, together with a reference to the specific objections to which they relate; and
 - 7) include an argument, presenting clearly the points of fact and law relied on in support of the position taken on each question, with specific page reference to the record and the legal or other material relied on.
- d) Any objection to a ruling, finding, conclusion, or recommendation that is not specifically stated shall be deemed to have been waived. Any brief in support of an objection that fails to comply with subsection (c) may be disregarded. Any brief in support of objections shall not refer to any matter not included within the scope of the objections and shall contain, in the recommendation indicated, a clear and concise statement of the case, containing all that is material to the consideration of the questions presented.
- e) The answering brief to the objections shall be limited to the questions raised in the objections and in the brief in support of the objections. It shall present clearly the points of fact and law relied on in support of the position taken on each question. When objection has been taken to a factual finding of the ALJ and the objection is proposed to support that finding, the answering brief should specify those pages of the record that, in the view of the party filing the brief, support the ALJ's finding.

825 f) Requests for extension of time to file an answering brief to the objection shall be
826 in writing and copies shall be served promptly on the other party.

827
828 g) Any matter not included in the objections may not thereafter be raised to the
829 Review Committee or in any further proceeding and is deemed waived for all
830 purposes.

831
832 h) The Review Committee may deny the motion for reconsideration, or it may grant
833 the motion in whole or in part and issue a new final decision in the matter. The
834 Review Committee must notify the law enforcement officer and their last
835 employing law enforcement agency within 14 days of a denial and state the
836 reasons for denial.

838 **Section 1790.670 Judicial Review**

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840 Actions for judicial review under this Part shall be filed where the hearing proceedings took
841 place, which is in the circuit court of either Cook County or Sangamon County.

Training Overviews

1. Executive Summit – Leading in the Aftermath: Trauma Informed Leadership Following a Critical Incident; Katharine Manning; October 3, 2024; Springfield; 20 attendees

You have the crisis response team, the communications plan, the tactical equipment. You've done the tabletop exercises. These will get you through the critical incident; but what comes next? How do you lead your department with strength and compassion when they've faced the worst?

In this session, we'll discuss how to lead in the weeks and months that follow a critical incident. We'll go over the supports to have in place, how to acknowledge trauma and grief while still inspiring meaning and hope, ways to build resilience, guarding against leadership fatigue at the helm, and more. *Join us to equip yourself with the tools and knowledge to guide your team with empathy and resilience in the aftermath of a critical event.*

2. Executive Summit - Intentional Leadership; Dean Crisp; October 8, 2024; East Peoria; 49 attendees

Much is expected of today's leaders. Today's workforce requires that leaders exhibit more emotional intelligence than in previous generations of leaders, but how to do that? Dean Crisp has taken the many lessons he's learned in his leadership journey and combined them with the trends he sees today to create an impactful presentation on how leaders can create the right environment for their workers to thrive, even during difficult times. Drawing on his books *The Leadership Recipe* and *Essential Leadership Lessons from the Thin Blue Line*, Dean talks about the importance of becoming bulletproof as a leader through a process that incorporates his 5 simple truths of leadership and small snippets from his Significant Leadership Program.

This training takes you on a journey of understanding how to best develop leaders by establishing your "why" of leadership and how to lead with intention. Unlike other leadership development classes, this class is designed to have you think about leading yourself and others in a new dynamic way. Topics include: Purpose of Leadership, What Type of Leader You Want To Be, The Mindset of a Leader, Create Direction, The Importance of Mentoring, and How to Have a Critical vs. Crucial Conversation.

3. Live Webinar – Child Death Investigations; Kiersten Reif; October 15, 2024; Zoom; 78 attendees

Child Death Investigations is a live two-hour webinar designed to provide law enforcement officers with in-depth instruction on best practices and investigative techniques for child death investigations. Death investigations involving children can be particularly challenging and complex as they are often sudden and unexpected. Law enforcement professionals are tasked with the responsibility of investigating these deaths meticulously, compassionately, and professionally while focusing on a complete investigation for a vulnerable member of our population. The instructor will cover a variety of child-focused topics including details of non-natural causes of death, common injuries, crucial case considerations, physical evidence, "red flag" observations, post-scene follow-up, and working with next of kin. The instructor will review multiple case studies to further expound upon the complex aspects of a child death investigation and encourage

critical thinking, prompting officers to prepare for the application of investigative techniques and evidence procedures at their agencies.

4. Executive Summit – Advanced Search & Seizure; John Wiehn; October 23, 2024; Downers Grove; 63 attendees

The Illinois Advanced Search & Seizure course is a comprehensive program specifically designed for Illinois law enforcement professionals who aspire to be proactive and legally defensible in their actions. Through fast-paced instruction, we use real-world case law to explain the intricacies of searches and seizures in federal and Illinois courts. The course is divided into several modules, beginning with a thorough understanding of the Fourth Amendment and its key principles. We then delve into the requirement of state action and what constitutes a Fourth Amendment search and seizure. Finally, we cover the legal issues surrounding the most commonly used searches and seizures by police officers, including citizen-consensual encounters, apparent authority to consent to search, investigative detentions, and more. The approach is high-energy and interactive, ensuring that students remain engaged and motivated throughout the course. Upon completion, all students will receive the Search & Seizure Survival Guide, which will serve as a valuable reference for future use.

Attending this course is an opportunity to equip yourself with the skills and knowledge needed to make legally defensible decisions in search and seizure situations. The outcome will be reduced liability for yourself and your agency and officers who possess the requisite knowledge to provide the highest level of service to the communities they are sworn to protect.

5. LEAD Series – Police Mid-Management Role in the 21st Century; October 28 – November 22, 2024; Peru PD; 13 attendees

PMR21C has been completely updated, overhauled, and transformed into an 80-hour, two-week format. PMR21C is an intensive intermediate-level leadership education program designed for law enforcement middle managers, as well as supervisors transitioning to middle management positions within their agencies/organizations. PMR21C focuses on project management, leading up, and looking six to twelve months into the future. The course provides middle managers with enhanced leadership abilities and the necessary competencies to lead and manage effectively in response to the ongoing needs of the community and their agency/organization itself.

Prerequisites – Applicants must be sworn law enforcement officers or law enforcement support personnel employed by a local, state, or federal agency at the “mid-management” level (Sergeants, Lieutenants, Watch Commanders) who manage major units or programs, contribute to the development of policy and procedures, are responsible for their implementation, and have authority over supervisory personnel; and Sergeants who have completed the Police Supervisory Role in the 21st Century course, or equivalent training, and have a minimum of 5 years in current rank.

In addition to classroom discussions, PMR21C provides participants with the opportunity to network with law enforcement executives from other agencies.

7. Live Webinar - Compassion Fatigue and Resilience When Working With Those in Trauma; Katharine Manning; November 7, 2024; Zoom

Working in the criminal justice system means being regularly exposed to trauma on top of the stress and demands of the job, as well as the challenges that we all face individually and as a society. This webinar provides insights into the prevalence of trauma in the professions, how it impacts criminal justice professionals, and strategies to counter its effects.

Then finally, we will work through ways that allow us to thrive through life! The goal is to learn how to prepare for, cope with, and grow through adversity so we can live a great story!

9. Live Webinar – Bulletproof Report Writing for LE Supervisors; Anthony Bandiero; November 14, 2024; Zoom

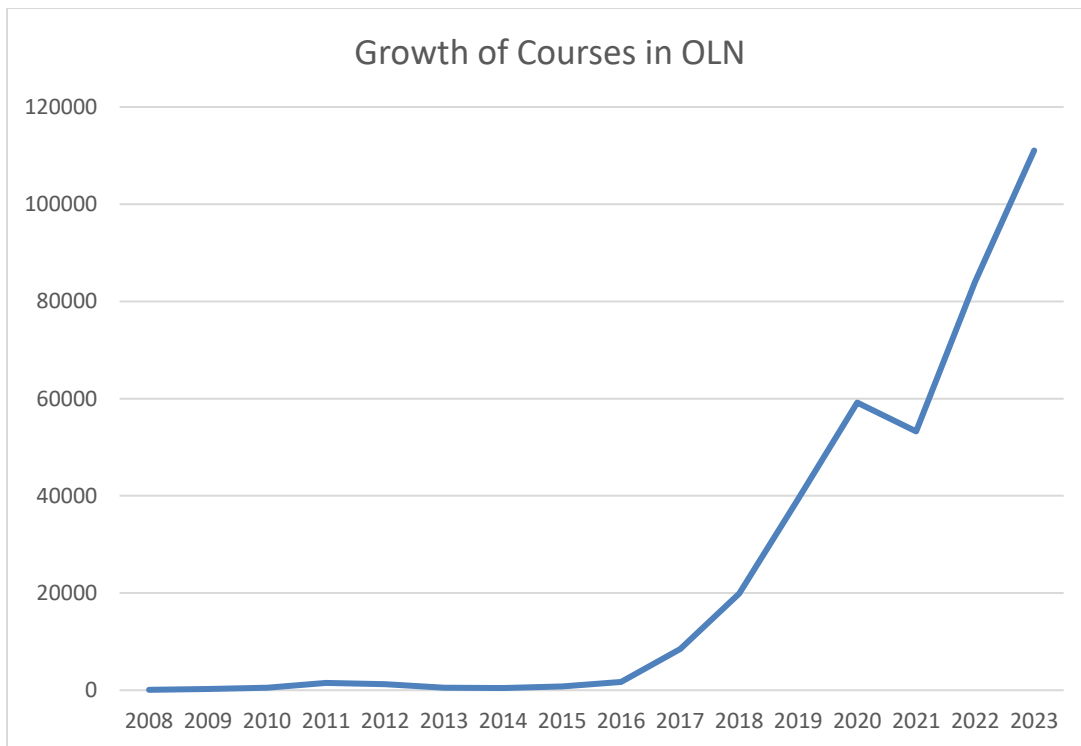

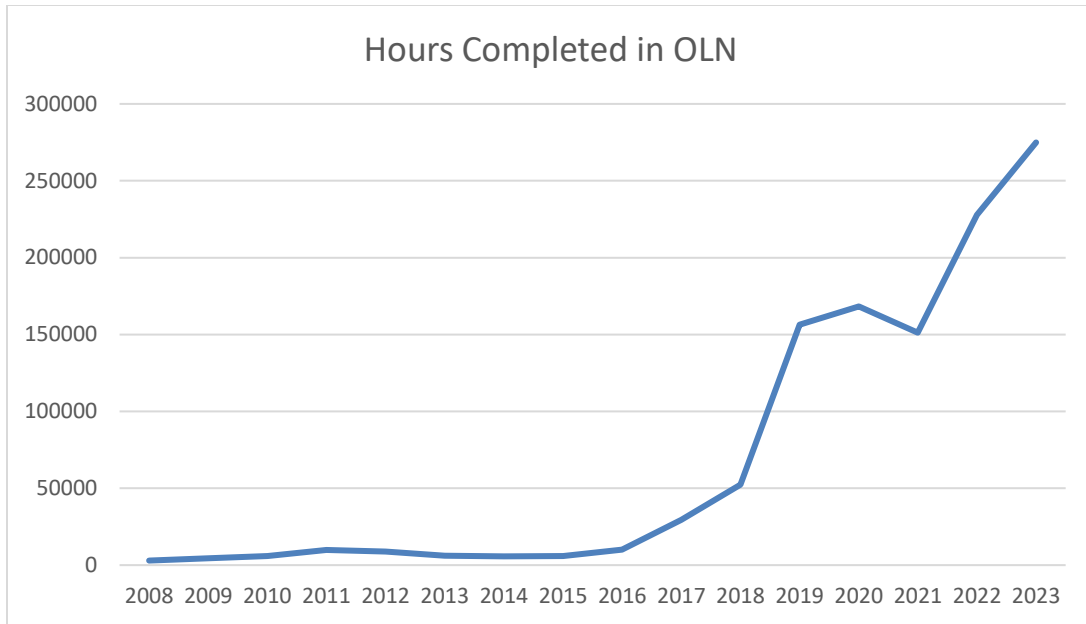
The Executive Institute continues to provide technological support for the web-based Part-Time Basic Law Enforcement Academy. Staff is currently conducting a quality management audit.

Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board Executive Institute A.S.S.I.S.T. Program

JT Wooldridge, Program Director

The Executive Institute A.S.S.I.S.T. Program (A Statewide System of In-Service Training) was started at the end of July 2023. This program consists of three major sections: State Law Enforcement Agencies (Course Certification, Instructor Approval, and class recognition), ILETSB K9 Certification, and the ILETSB IROCC (Illinois Retired Officer's Concealed Carry) Program, along with several entities that do not fall within these sections directly. The EI - A.S.S.I.S.T. Program also works directly with the rest of the Executive Institute and ILETSB staff with assistance in conferences and training, along with the administration of the IDOT Grant.

Since the inception of the EI – A.S.S.I.S.T. Program, several State Law Enforcement agencies have used our program to get their courses ILETSB certified, along with getting their instructors approved to provide the instruction. This is helping agencies to fulfill mandate requirements per the Illinois Safe-T Act.

In September, we held another training (Modified High-Risk Traffic Stops) specific to certain State Law Enforcement Agencies, that did not fit in the criteria of other law enforcement agencies was created by Executive Institute/EI - A.S.S.I.S.T. with ITOA and was conducted for two classes in Southern Illinois with the offering of SILEC to allow us to utilize their facility. With the success of this course, another is being planned for northern Illinois for early Spring for personnel in that region.

Fortunately, with the E.I. – A.S.S.I.S.T. Program location in the ILETSB building, we are able to utilize the training areas of the building for State Law Enforcement trainings to host, along with Executive Institute Conferences. The facility was used for a four-day Instructor Development Course put on by the Illinois Department of Conservation which also had personnel from Illinois Secretary of State Police, which was greatly appreciated with plans to use again, due to the available capacity, state of the art equipment and location.

The K9 Certification/Re-certification team, which includes ILETSB Legal Counsel, has been working on ways of updating the program. This is to help ensure accurate information on forms and keep the certification process up to date. This program has scheduling in several locations around the state with dates scheduled throughout the year to assist the Department's K9 handlers and the K9 assessors. For updates on the K9 Program statistics, see the included report.

The IROCC, which consists of nearly 10,000 applicants yearly, has been working alongside Levi, Ray and Shoup, Inc. in the updating of the website and application process to help with the vetting

of applicants and making operations more efficient. For updates on the IROCC Program numbers, see the included report.

The EI - A.S.S.I.S.T. Program with the assistance of ILETSB was able to get the long awaited VirTra System installed at ILETSB, which is one of only two of this particular system in the State of Illinois and will be open to State, County, and municipal departments on a scheduling bases including the various shift hours worked by law enforcement so as to ensure the opportunity to train at the most fiscally responsible times for the law enforcement community. ILETSB has six trained operators of the system with the ability to train others within a department to implement known law enforcement practices and standards as adopted by individual departments policy and procedure, while following their agencies legal recommendation for use of force training.

As you can see, the Executive Institute A.S.S.I.S.T. Program has achieved a great deal in a short amount of time and continues to strive as a program

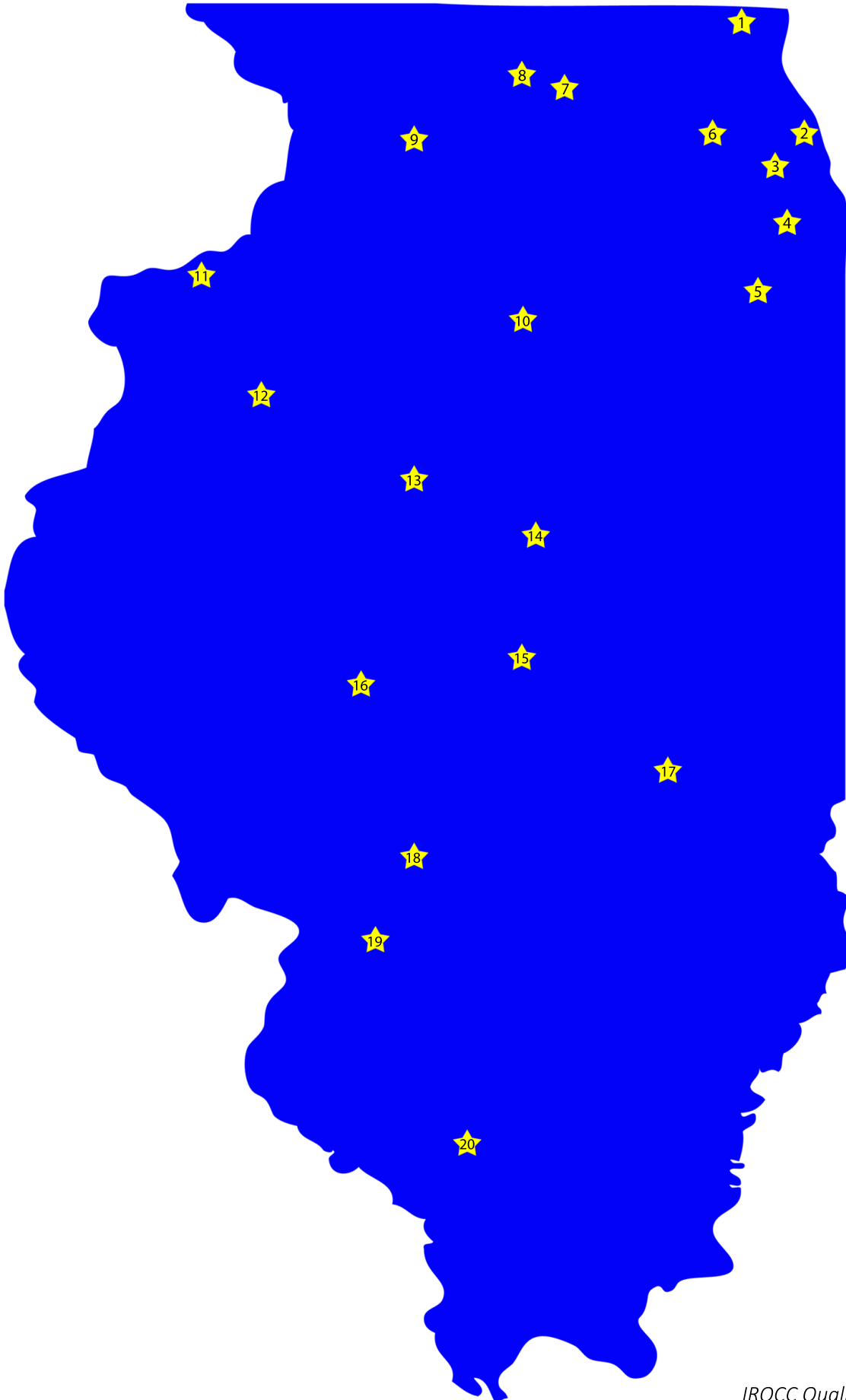

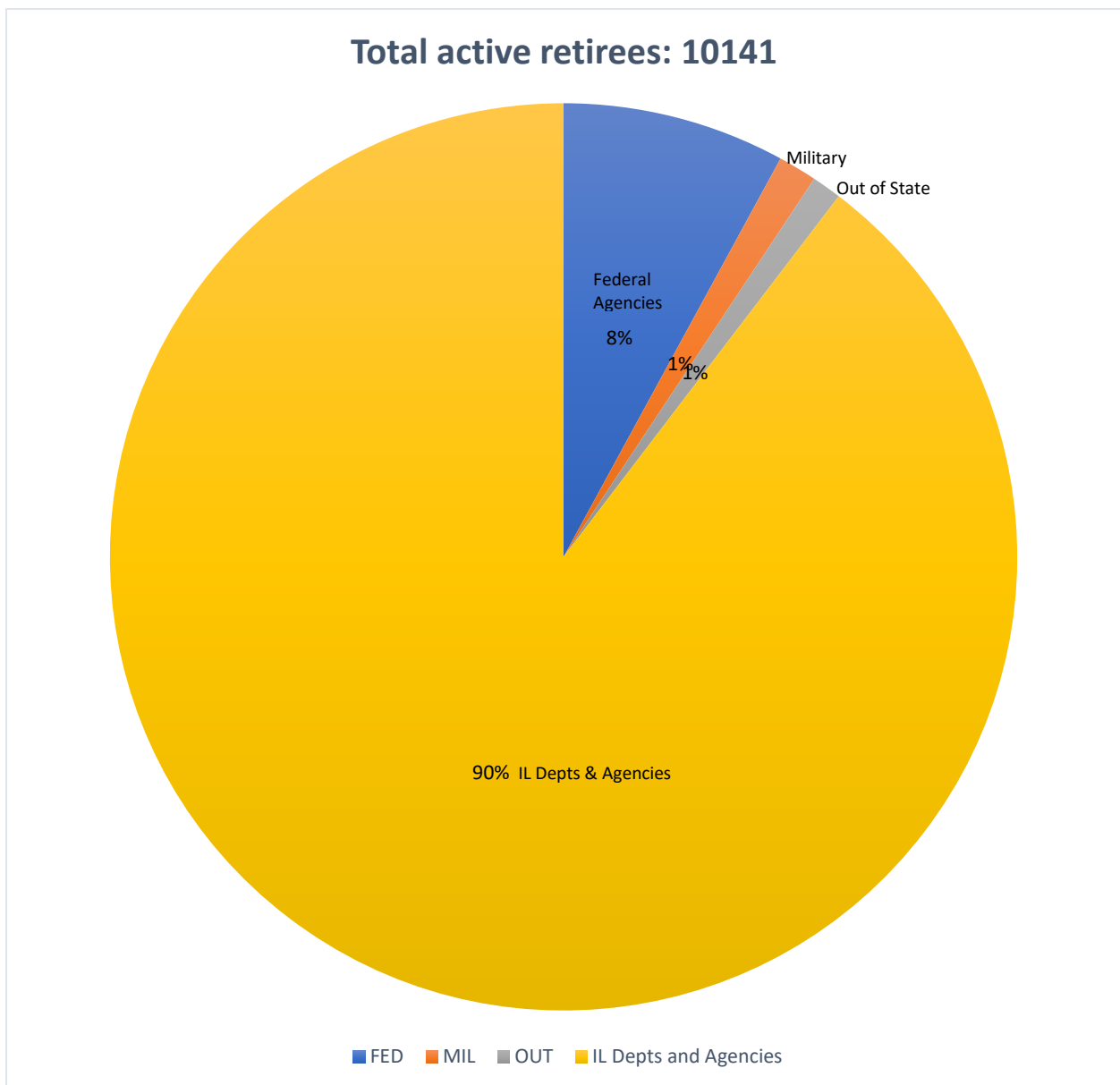

This report provides an update of the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board Federal Homeland Security Grant funded through the Illinois Homeland Security Advisory Council (HSAC).

TRAINING AND FUNDING

ILETSB has been a voting member of the Illinois Homeland Security Advisory Council and recipient of homeland security funds since 2002. ILETSB has two active awards, Federal Fiscal Years 2020 and 2021; each award is \$391,000. ILETSB is currently in Federal Fiscal Year 2020 with the performance period ending June 30, 2023.

ILLINOIS HOMELAND SECURITY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Illinois Homeland Security Advisory Council met on October 23, 2024. The national and state homeland security updates were provided by STIC.

Chief Security Information Officer Jennifer Rominger provided a cyber security briefing.

HSAC members voted and approved on unspent funds going towards projects submitted by HSAC membership.

Next full quarterly meeting of the HSAC will be on January 22, 2025 at 10:00 am at IEMA.

LAW ENFORCEMENT MUTUAL AID COMMITTEE

CENTER FOR HOMELAND SECURITY LEADERSHIP

Program Director – Derek Carle

Derek Carle continues to serve on the Illinois Homeland Security Advisory Council (IHSAC) and serves on two sub-committees of the IHSAC: Law Enforcement Mutual Aid Committee and the new Prevention Committee.

Derek serves on three national committees pertaining to law enforcement and incident management. Derek is a member of a law enforcement committee to address incident command/NIMS to law enforcement executives, command staff and officers. Derek is also on the Incident Commander and Intelligence/Investigations committees.

Derek is also a credentialed Type 2 Incident Commander for the State of Illinois.

Planning Workshops

During this quarter the Mobile Training Units held 9 workshops for 219 officers totaling 2,408 hours of training. UASI held 0 workshops. The workshops were paid out of the FFY2021 HSGP.

Active Threat Master Course

Funding has been provided by ILETSB to conduct our fifth class in the spring of 2025. Tentative dates are: March 10-14, April 7-11, April 28-May 2, and May 13-17. I have received several applications for this spring class.

The Illinois Active Threat Master Instructor Certification Program builds upon the ITOA's (Illinois Tactical Officers Association) TPO (Tactical Patrol Officer) program by offering an advanced certification for current instructors throughout the state.

The 4-week program will certify instructors to teach: Use of Force, High Risk Patrol Tactics, Active Threat/Rapid Deployment, Solo Officer Response, Rescue Task Force, and Urban Tactic/MACTAC (Multiple Assault Counter Terrorist Action Capabilities).

Homeland Security Workshop Catalog

With guidance from Mobile Team Unit Coordinators, staff continues to review and revise the workshop catalog. Coordinators are encouraged to submit new workshops for consideration.

Based on the desire of the Illinois Homeland Security Director and the IHSAC, the homeland security grant guidance and catalog will be going through a small revision. The core courses for the catalog will consist of the Active Threat Master course (every other year), Active Threat End-User courses, Community Behavioral Threat Assessment (different from school based Behavioral Threat Assessment), Digital Threat Assessment, Cyber Security, Domestic Violent Extremism, Soft Targets/Crowded Spaces and a few of the popular courses that address the Vision 2025 Homeland Security Strategy.

This report provides an update on the administration of the ASSIST Program including: the 1st Quarter Report for FY25. Presented below are some of the ASSIST administrative matters to include Training and Fiscal reports.

Attachment I provides the ASSIST program training activity report results through the first quarter of Fiscal Year 2025 to include all 13 MTU's. This chart provides information from each Mobile Team Unit: number of training course hours, total number of students attending the training programs, man hours and number of courses offered including a breakdown of cost based upon formulas to determine hourly cost for instructors and students. The Fiscal Year totals for the first quarter are listed below: (It should be noted that MTU 3 data is provided to IT at ILETSB and is not automatically generated or uploaded like all others and this can cause delays in reporting & data import errors. However, scheduling dumps have been established by staff to ensure that officers are credited timely for having attended a course for compliant purposes).

Attachment II provides a financial overview of the total budgets operationally for the MTU's including expected Specialized Training requests along with the MTU's ten percent match. To date, the Board has approved release of two payments to the Mobile Team Units including payments to CPD for their In-Service Training needs. In FY25, Specialized Training expenses have been expounded upon to include CIT, SRO, & LHI courses approved through the respective managers of these programs.

Attachment III provides two graph listings with ALL Certified Training for MTU's and the reported total number of hours as well as a breakdown as to the number of hours within each of the 18 Mandated Training areas. These graphs provide the wide range of In-Service Training as well as the attention placed on each mandate as it relates to the demand within each MTU.

Attachment IV represents the current listing of MTU directors and locations of MTU offices and training sites. An addition to the map includes the State ASSIST Division located within the ILETSB office in Springfield that represents all state agencies for In-House training applications, instructors, and certification through the Executive Institute

Attachment V represents the current listing of MTU geographical locations and represented agencies and officers being trained and listed within each MTU area.

Attachment VI represents the current Part-time Police Training Academy dates and graduations as set by each entity.

Attachment VII represents ALL In-Service Courses currently certified by the board. This list is presented to the Board for review and approval is requested certification all course listed for Calendar Year 2025. Courses including those courses offered by the Mobile Training Units as well as those courses vetted by MTU staff and certified under the same vetting process for In-House training held by departments with approved instructors.

Closure The Board has been extremely pleased with the MTU's over the course of the last two years regarding the implementation of the SAFE-T Act. Both the Board and the MTU's are entering the final six months of the three-year compliance time span offered departments and officers to become compliant with all mandates. This process has been both a learning experience and challenge to meet the demand of this reform in training. Much has been built and designed along the way, and a great deal of our success in the venue of training is the responsibility of the Mobile Training Units and their staff. These 1st quarter numbers will clearly display the hard work and dedication each MTU has for their memberships which have established new highs in officer turnout, and hours trained, over the course of last two-years and further provide a leveling out of training as departments, staff, and officers have established a greater understanding of the cycle of training in their design to meet the mandates. Although In-Service training can be seen in trends during the year, we are coming out of one of the busiest years in MTU history. ILETSB has certified over 5,000 plus courses to which MTU's have conducted over 7,000 classes throughout the state in all aspects of training during the FY24 time-period and have conducted 1,360 classes in the current fiscal year.

The ILETSB Training Division continues to build upon the ASSIST Program and will continue to strive in providing departments and officers quality training through various partnerships established by MTU's and the Board. We are on track to finish this fiscal year in allowing every officer in the state the opportunity to be in compliance by June 30, 2025 as we prepare for our first round of verification beginning October 2025.

This report is a summary of the most significant staff activity related to the administration of the ASSIST program during the first quarter of Fiscal Year 2025.

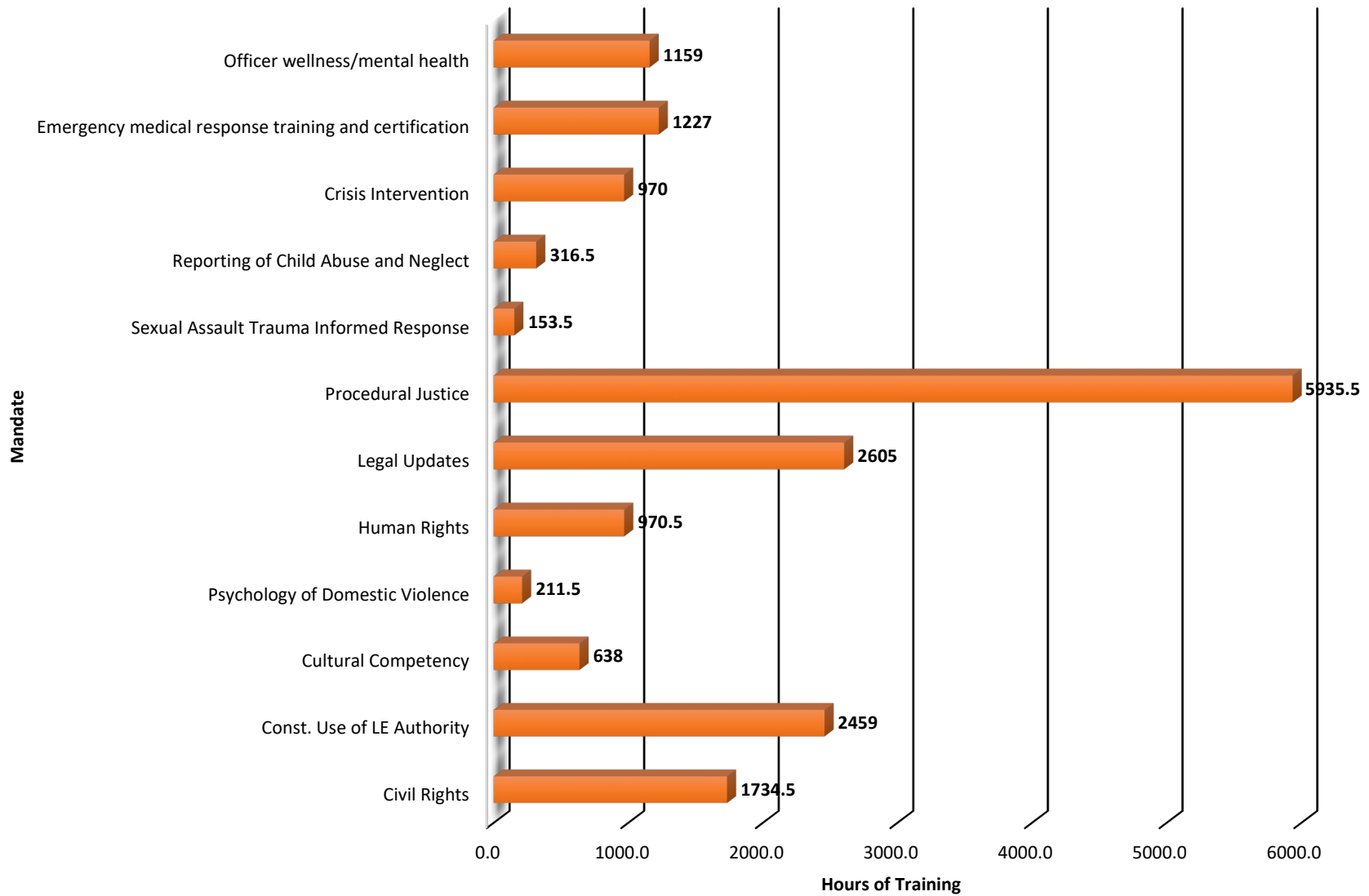

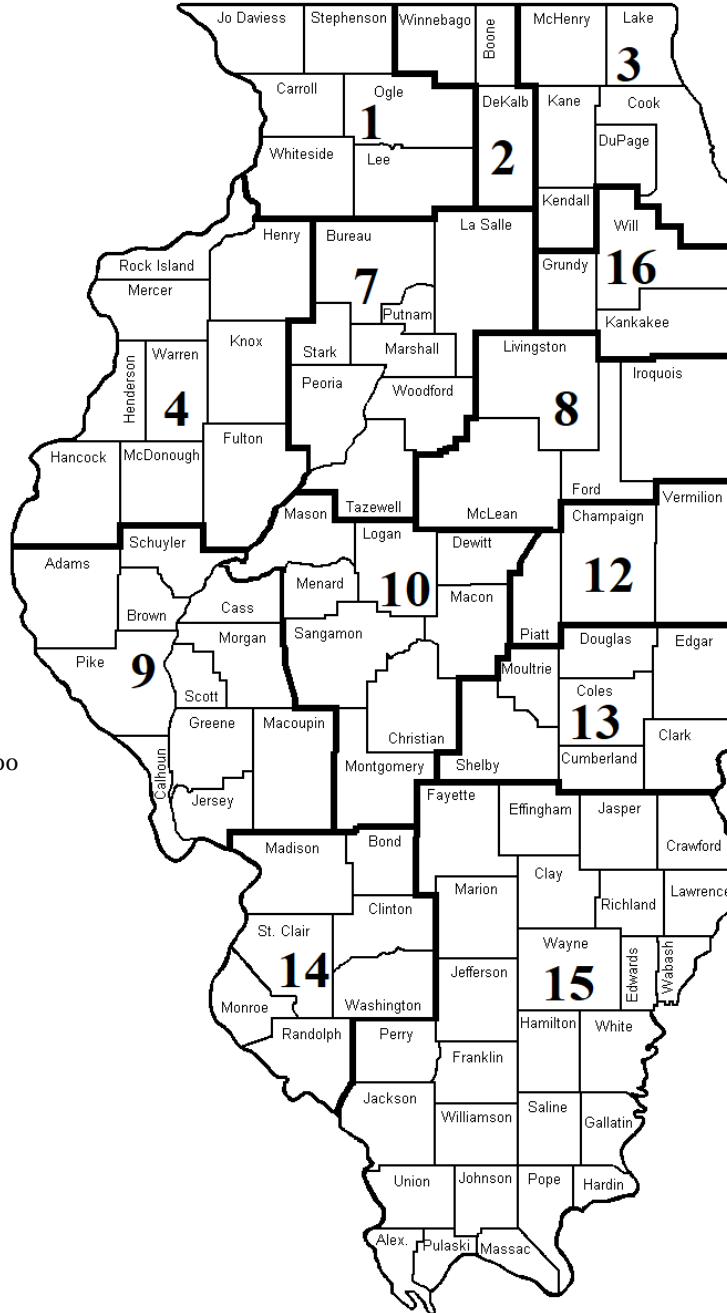

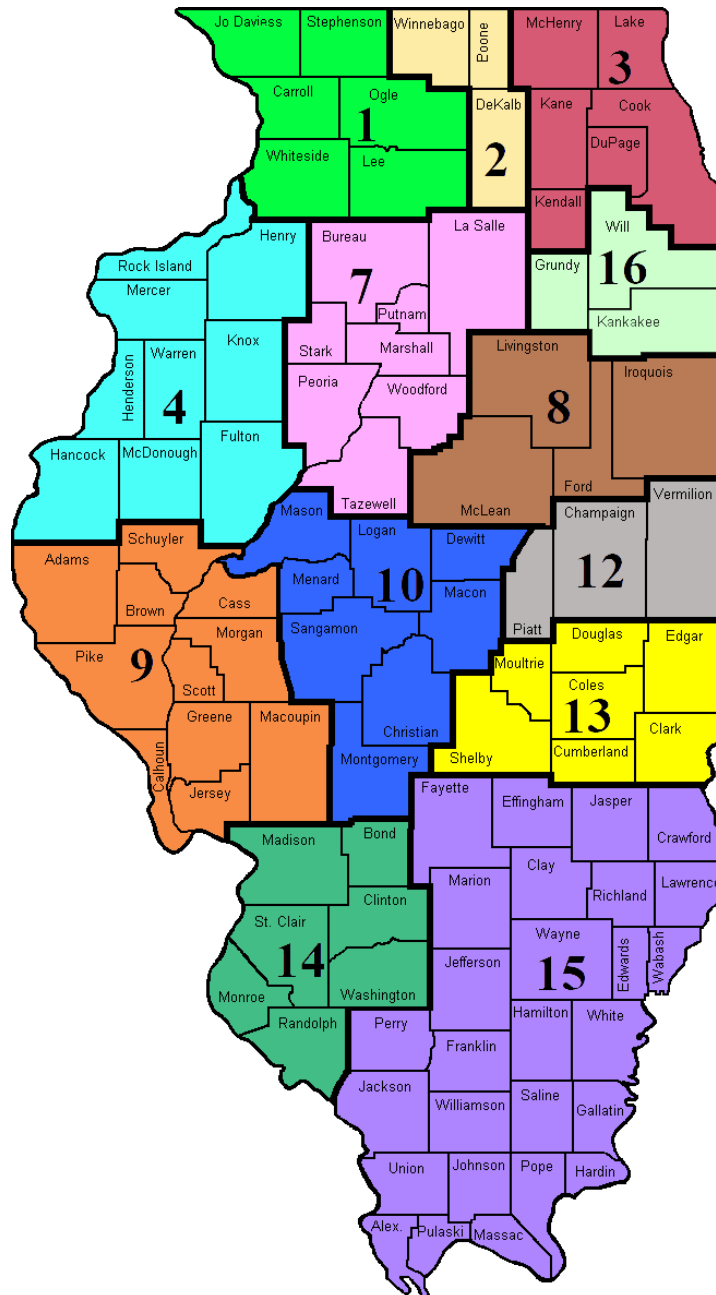

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QUARTERLY REPORT FOR THE DECEMBER 5, 2024 BOARD MEETING CRISIS INTERVENTION TEAM TRAINING (CIT)

This report provides an update on the administration of the Board's Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training programs as well as various related mental health and de-escalation trainings.

CIT Training Courses/Series:

As has been the case with past fiscal years, the CIT training series remains at the forefront of course requests from around the state. Staff has approved more than 290 CIT, mental health, suicide prevention, officer wellness, autism, de-escalation and related courses for this fiscal year through our Mobile Teams and Chicago PD. I thank the Board and our MTU partners for their continued support of these important programs. Particular items to note: Board staff is continuing to work with the Chicago Police Department's CIT training unit to ensure their curriculum is up to date (and in line with the modifications approved by this Board) as well as ensuring their instructors and content experts have all the necessary documentation filed and approved by our office. One other concept that we are working on is utilizing Second City Chicago (improv theatre group) to help replenish and increase our pool of actors. With the demand for training so high, we are trying to be as proactive as possible to onboard actors as soon as possible. I'll keep the Board apprised as this initiative moves forward.

CIT K-9 Therapy Dog Initiative:

Since last reported at the September Board meeting, Trooper has been making appearances statewide. He's helped greet test takers and training attendees at the office, attended various CIT trainings, participated in community events or local outings, and was most recently invited to Argo High School, Heritage Middle School as well as the Summit Police Department (where they've asked for him to be a regular visitor/partner in their community)! Trooper is a calming soul who continues to do a phenomenal job!

I'm happy to report that our partnership with Operation TT, the Tails of Redemption Program and the Cook County Sheriff's Office K-9 team are progressing nicely, and we are on track to expand the CIT K-9 Therapy Dog program around the state. Please keep an eye on

our website and social media platforms for additional information on Trooper and this new initiative!

CIT Statewide Conference:

Save the Date.....the 2025 CIT State Conference will be held on June 25 and 26, 2025 at the Embassy Suites in East Peoria. As we know that CIT is more than training, our theme this year is Building Bridges: Strengthening Collaborations in Crisis Intervention. Although we are still in the preliminary stages of planning, we already have some fantastic speakers lined up to discuss prioritizing mental wellness, integrated crisis response teams, cultivating collaborations, peer support programs and more! For those interested in presenting at the conference, we will open the “Call for Presentations” the beginning of January. Be on the lookout for additional information on this biennial conference as they become available!

For Staff:

*DISC training (October 2024)

For Myself- of CIT/MH significance:

*Mobile Crisis Teams – Preston Looper (October 2024)

*Compassion Fatigue & Resilience When Working with Those in Trauma – Manning (Oct '24)

For Other Entities:

*Will County – Will county has received a federal grant to have their region (law enforcement, fire, EMT's, health care, etc.) trained in CIT training and has reached out to our team to assist with this endeavor. I want to thank the local MTU for their assistance with some of the admin duties including making sure the officer who attend this training receive mandate credit.

*ICAT – Board staff has been working with the ICAT team in Decatur as they were in need of professional actors for their ICAT training program and inquired if we could assist. I'm happy to report that we will be working/partnering with ICAT and the local MTU to assist them with their training needs.

CESSA:

Just a quick update to let you know that the CESSA statewide group continues to meet as well as the subcommittees. Progress is being made for implementation around the state; however, because of the enormous task at hand, a legislative extension (via bill) was approved to extend the deadline until July 2025. I will keep the Board apprised of substantive updates.

Healing Centered Illinois Task Force:

Pursuant to PA 93-103, the Chairman of ILETSB (or their designee) was included on the State's new initiative to make Illinois a Healing Centered state. As such, I have been asked to serve as the ILETSB designee on the Healing Centered Task Force. The HCTF was created to advance the State's efforts to become trauma-informed and healing-centered through improved alignment of existing efforts, common definitions and metrics and strategic planning for long-term transformation. I'm happy to report that the various subcommittees have met numerous times throughout the past few months and have come up with preliminary recommendations that will be submitted to the General Assembly by the

December 2024 deadline. Although the recommendations are just a beginning, they are important steps to further guide us to a more healing state. I'm proud to have been a part of this initiative and look forward to continuing with these efforts. I will keep the Board apprised as this progresses.

CIT and Mental Health Awareness Training and Resource Institute:

As the Board has been offering the basic CIT training since 2003 and various off-shoots of mental health training including the CIT series, Mental Health Awareness and Response – and Intro to CIT, peer support pilot programs, officer wellness, etc. we are looking to the future to the possibility of creating a CIT and Mental Health Awareness Training & Resource Institute – perhaps in conjunction with the 988/CESSA roll out. It is really just a larger defined umbrella to the works we are already doing including, but not limited to:

- CIT training series for in-service
- Intro to CIT training in academies (CIT Concepts)
- CIT resources
- MHA and Response Training and Resources
- Peer support training and resources (model policies and best practices)
- Support pilot programs on peer support
- Officer wellness training and resources
- Resources for families of law enforcement officers
- Co-responder model policy and best practices
- Therapy/Comfort dog assistance – Tails of Redemption (TOR) through the Cook County Sheriff's Office, and Operation TT through the PBPA
- Add on training for social workers, paramedics, fire, and additional courses for dispatch (as allowed)
- De-escalation training by CIT Instructors
- Provide opportunities for ICAT training
- Summits/conferences (may also assist with training mandates)
- Increase awareness of resources via first responder app
- Become a repository for best practices statewide
- Create a reporting mechanism (to assist with getting federal funds)
- Ongoing research and curriculum updates/development

Although we have not yet begun on this initiative, as soon as the Board retains additional staff to help support such an extensive resource platform, we will move forward with this concept.

Pursuant to PA 100-984, the Board was charged with developing a course of training for School Resource Officers. I am happy to report that our stand-alone SRO course through the MTU's is going well. To date, the Board has received approximately 960 SRO application/waiver requests from agencies statewide (not including CPD). Of those applications/waiver requests, we have been able to issue 870 SRO certificates and 177 recertifications. These SRO certificates are good for two (2) years before an officer/agency must reapply.

As a reminder, Initial SRO Certification and SRO Recertification forms are available on the Board's website. Information on courses as related to SRO certification/waivers and SRO recertification are also listed on the Board's website.

In 1985, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) sponsored a committee for the development of guidelines for the certification of those pursuing the specialty area of Crash Reconstruction. A formal program was adopted by the Board in 1986.

Board staff did not have any individuals sit for the Crash Reconstruction Specialist certification exam within the 1st quarter of FY25.

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Information Services Board Report 4th Quarter – December 2024

Information Services Staff Development:

On-Line Training Services have been acquired for self-paced learning as needed for expansion of technical services – The available courses cover a broad range of subjects to supplement and expand the technical acumen of the Information Services Team

Network & Security Services:

Purpose: To promote growth, enhancement and preservation of Board Applications, Data and Cyber-Security services – Regular monitoring of suspect Cyber-Traffic is conducted to address potential threats to the Board's Network, Staff and Data Services – Further progress has been made in implementing Microsoft's Enterprise Configuration Management (ECM) Services and Cisco's Identity Services Engine (ISE) Management Software – Both ECM and ISE have improved technical structure and reliability – They also provide insight into the network services, digital traffic and potential vulnerabilities – MCM will be designed to create hardware inventory reports and software distribution to Staff Systems and ILETSSB Servers

To enhance the security of Staff Remote Services, efforts are underway to replace the Board's FireWall and upgrade VPN Client Services - In the event of loss or theft, all Staff Assigned Systems are fully Encrypted to prevent loss or compromise of the data contained within – Efforts are currently underway to upgrade all Staff Systems to Windows 11 by the end of Fiscal Year 2025 (June 2025) – Penetration Scanning for potential vulnerabilities of public-facing network and web services is conducted on a weekly basis

○ *Network Security:*

Created additional servers for supplementary identity verification - Secure login services established for all network devices

○ *Wireless Services:*

- Security: Implemented new service to ensure only authorized users access the ILETSSB wireless networks
- Guest Wi-Fi Simplification: Simplified process and interface for ILETSSB guests to connect to Wi-Fi more easily
- Chicago: Wireless Network Established – Guest enhancements to come

○ *VPN Services:*

- Improved Security with two-step verification
- Client Upgrade pending

Data Services:

Consisting of 25+ Windows and Linux Servers; each designed for specific functional services, flexible Storage Capacity, operational redundancy and enhanced Security – Servers continue to be established to suit the changing operational needs of ILETSB Network Services – The process of creating new Public-Facing Servers Web and Database Services continues with focus being on individualized services - Directory Services restructuring is on-going to streamline data collaboration and logistical availability –Data Mapping is regularly reviewed to provide the most efficient back-up and restore capabilities in the event of catastrophic failure – Future efforts will enhance Back-Up Services to ideally provide real-time synchronization and assurance of ILETSB Databanks

Contingency/Disaster Recovery Back-up Services:

In the event of Catastrophic Failure or Cyber-Compromised Events, future plans will include the synchronous integration of Springfield and Chicago Network Services for Tertiary Off-Site Data Storage for preservation and restoration purposes – Redundant Power Supply Services are slated for implementation to offer a more reliable and capable provision of power to essential Network and Data Services in the event of a power-loss

ILETSB In-House Applications:

Regularly scheduled Steering Committee meetings are conducted with pertinent ILETSB Division Personnel for opportunity to provide input of functionality improvements, necessary modifications, and reporting provisions of the applications - Next Wave Modifications have been identified, prioritized and are currently in the process of development

PTB/LEDI:

Investigation Tracking - PTB has recently been updated to allow the Certification Division to track their investigations electronically. This will allow all supporting documentation and other essential information regarding an investigation to be tracked in one central repository.

Agency Compliance Reports have been implemented to allow Agencies and Departments to easily track which officer mandates are near-future expiring and provide reports of officers who are out of compliance - Development of the PTB-LEDI Applications has been temporarily paused to allow focus on other Development Projects

Officer Portal:

Enables Officers to review their own Law Enforcement Records and Requirements – With the integration of the Professional Conduct Database the individuals have the opportunity to review and respond to Professional Conduct Reports Electronically - Since going live, the on-line Officer Portal now has grown to 21,000 Law Enforcement Individuals as of November 1st; up 1,000 additional Officers from September's count– Support and development of the Portal is on-going in conjunction with the PTB-LEDI application

LETM:

Law Enforcement Training Management (LETM) application development is slated to begin with the anticipated on-boarding and training of a new ILETSB Staff Developer – The application will undergo a full review and will benefit having a dedicated developer to improve and re-write current application and its services – On-Boarding of the new Development position is underway; Start Date Nov 18th

Legal Hearing System:

The System will be utilized for tracking the documentation of hearings pertaining to Officer reactivation and decertification – Development and implementation of the new Application for ILET SB’s Legal Division is nearing fulfillment– Anticipated completion is slated for 1st Quarter 2025

EvaExam (Scantron) On-Line Testing:

Digital On-Line Testing Services for State-Wide Law Enforcement entities and individuals continues with measured success and acceptance – Testing continues in both the Springfield and Chicago Offices, with plans to establish additional locations based on location, space accommodations and network requirements - Expansion of On-Line Testing will include all Testing Formats, including Basic Law Enforcement, Equivalency and Correctional Officer Exams

ILETSB Chicago:

Camera and Badging walk-through was completed in December of 2023, however implementation has been delayed due to scheduling and follow-up with State of Illinois Central Management Services – WAN, LAN and Wi-Fi Services have been implemented and established with the Springfield Office – Rooms and areas have been identified and purposed for operational and network services - The Server Room has been secured for operational service and storage of On-Line Testing Hardware (Awaiting HVAC Cooling Installation)

Evidentiary Video Submissions Repository:
